STUDY NUMBER ONE - [PSALM 1:1-6](#)

NOTES

QUESTIONS:

1. Read Psalm 1 and in your own words pull out the main thought of this passage.

2. What three things does the happy man refrain from doing in verse 1?

3. What two things does the happy man do, according to verse 2?

4. Define the words “delights” and “meditates” in verse 2.

5. What four things are said about the “tree” in verse 3?

6. What are the “wicked” like, according to verse 4?

7. What will the “wicked” not do, according to verse 5?

8. Summarize “the way of the righteous” and “the way of the wicked,” according to verse 6.

9. What verse in the Psalm has meant the most to you?

10. What lesson have you learned from this Psalm?

LESSONS FROM THE PASSAGE:

What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

LESSON #1: The happy man does not “walk in the counsel of the wicked,” “stand in the way of sinners,” or “sit in the seat of mockers.”

LESSON #2: “The plans of the righteous are just, but the advice of the wicked is deceitful” (Proverbs 12:5).

LESSON #3: The righteous man flees the way of sinners and follows after righteousness, godliness, faith, love, perseverance, and gentleness.

LESSON #4: The Lord “mocks proud mockers but gives grace to the humble” (Proverbs 3:34).

LESSON #5: The happy man finds “his delight in the law of the Lord.”

LESSON #6: "Your words were found and I ate them; and Your words were to me a joy and the rejoicing of my heart; for I am called by Your name, O Lord God of hosts" (Jeremiah 15:16 TAB).

LESSON #7: The happy man meditates on the words of God day and night.

LESSON #8: The happy man is like a tree, planted in the most ideal place, yielding fruit in season, his leaf stays green and whatever he does prospers.

LESSON #9: The wicked are like chaff that are literally blown away.

LESSON #10: The wicked will not have a leg to stand on in the day of judgment.

LESSON #11: The Lord watches over the way of the righteous.

LESSON #12: "The way of the wicked will perish."

ADDITIONAL NOTES:

STUDY NUMBER TWO - [PSALM 8:1-9](#)

NOTES

QUESTIONS:

1. Read Psalm 8 and in your own words pull out the main thought of this passage.

2. Stop for a few moments and reflect on why the Lord's name is "majestic in all the earth."

3. From whom has the Lord "ordained praise," according to verse 2?

4. What is the Lord's relationship to creation, according to verse 3?

5. To whom is the Psalmist referring in verse 5?

6. What two things has the Father done for the son, according to verse 6?

7. What else has been placed under the son's authority, according to verses 7 & 8?

8. How does the Psalm begin and end, according to verses 1 & 9?

9. What verse in the Psalm has meant the most to you?

10. What lesson have you learned from this Psalm?

LESSONS FROM THE PASSAGE:

What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

LESSON #1: It brings delight to the heart of God when His children praise Him.

LESSON #2: Lord, You have covered the heavens with Your glory!

LESSON #3: Lord, thank You for the joy of knowing that it is out of the mouths of infants and nursing babes that You have prepared praise for Yourself.

LESSON #4: Lord, there is great fulfillment in the acknowledgment of the fact that You are the Creator and the Sustainer of this great universe.

LESSON #5: Lord, because of Your greatness, it is hard for us to comprehend that You are mindful of us and You care for us.

LESSON #6: The Lord is mindful of us and He does care for us.

LESSON #7: Lord, thank You for creating us the way You did—a little less than divine and crowning us with “glory and honor.”

LESSON #8: Lord, thank You for putting us in charge of Your hand-crafted world.

LESSON #9: Lord, hasten the day when creation will be set free from the curse of corruption and You will reign as King of kings and Lord of lords.

LESSON #10: “Therefore also God highly exalted him, and bestowed on him the name which is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of those who are in heaven, and on the earth, and under the earth, and that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father” (Philippians 2:9-11).

ADDITIONAL NOTES:

STUDY NUMBER THREE - [PSALM 13:1-6](#)

NOTES

QUESTIONS:

1. Read Psalm 13 and in your own words pull out the main thought of this passage.

2. Meditate on the three questions in verse 1 and then ask yourself the question, How do these three questions apply to my situation?

3. Meditate on the two questions in verse 2 and ask yourself the question, How do these questions apply to me?

4. What kind of questions do you think the Psalmist is wrestling with in verse 2?

5. Read 1 John 5:14, 15 and apply it to the first petition in verse 3: “Look on me and answer O Lord, my God.”

6. What three reasons are given in the last part of verse 3 and verse 4 as to why there is such urgency in the prayer of the Psalmist?

7. In what does the Psalmist “trust” and “rejoice” in, according to verse 5?

8. Why is the Psalmist “singing to the Lord,” according to verse 6?

9. What verse in the Psalm has meant the most to you?

10. What lesson have you learned from this Psalm?

LESSONS FROM THE PASSAGE:

What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

LESSON #1: Time seems to go so slow when we are in the furnace of affliction.

LESSON #2: God is never in a hurry when He is working out His purpose and plan in our lives.

LESSON #3: We are very precious to the Lord and He will never forget us.

LESSON #4: “Many are the plans in a man’s heart, but it is the Lord’s purpose that prevails” (Proverbs 19:21).

LESSON #5: “For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways,’ declares the Lord. ‘As the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts” (Isaiah 55:8, 9).

LESSON #6: Perhaps we not only need to ask the Lord to look on us, but to ask the Lord to give us a fresh vision of who He is and what He can do.

LESSON #7: “It is of the Lord’s mercies that we are not consumed, because his compassions fail not. They are new every morning: great is thy faithfulness (Lamentations 3:22, 23 KJV).

LESSON #8: Just because our circumstances are difficult, does not mean that He does not love us.

LESSON #9: Is your heart rejoicing in your salvation?

LESSON #10: Are you singing to the Lord because He has been good to you?

STUDY NUMBER FOUR - PSALM 15:1-5**NOTES****QUESTIONS:**

1. Read Psalm 15 and in your own words pull out the main thought of this passage.

2. What is the Psalmist's concern, according to verse 1?

3. What three things qualify a person to dwell in the Lord's sanctuary and live on His holy hill, according to verse 2?

4. What three things qualify a person to dwell in His sanctuary and live on His holy hill, according to verse 3?

5. What three things qualify a person for dwelling in His sanctuary and living on His holy hill, according to verse 4?

6. What two things qualify a man to dwell in the Lord's sanctuary and to live on His holy hill, according to verse 5?

7. What do you think the Psalmist means in verse 4 when he says, "Who keeps his oath even when it hurts?"

8. What is the final promise given to the one who does all these things, according to verse 5?

9. What verse in the Psalm has meant the most to you?

10. What lesson have you learned from this Psalm?

LESSONS FROM THE PASSAGE:

What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

LESSON #1: Have you made your reservations for the marriage supper of the Lamb by inviting the Lord Jesus to come into your heart and become your Savior?

LESSON #2: Is your “walk blameless,” your work “righteous,” and your words “truth from your heart?”

LESSON #3: A person with a critical spirit is walking in the flesh rather than in the power of the Spirit.

LESSON #4: The Christian army is the only army where you have to wear your armor to protect yourself from your friends.

LESSON #5: Your walk is far more important than your talk.

LESSON #6: “But like the Holy One who called you, be holy yourselves also in all your behavior; because it is written, ‘You shall be holy, for I am holy’” (1 Peter 1:15, 16).

LESSON #7: “[Let your] love be sincere—a real thing; hate what is evil (loathe all ungodliness, turn in horror from wickedness), but hold fast to that which is good” (Romans 12:9 Amplified).

LESSON #8: Remember, a godly person “keeps his oath even when it hurts.”

LESSON #9: Are you being a blessing to others with the funds that the Lord has allowed you to have?

LESSON #10: “Therefore, my beloved brethren, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that your [labor] is not in vain in the Lord” (1 Corinthians 15:58).

STUDY NUMBER FIVE - [PSALM 19:1-14](#)

NOTES

QUESTIONS:

1. Read Psalm 19 and in your own words pull out the main thought of this passage.

2. What do the “heavens” and the “skies” do, according to verse 1?

3. How is the “sun” described by the Psalmist in verses 5 & 6?

4. What two things does the “law of the Lord” do, according to verse 7?

5. What two things does the Word of the Lord do, according to verse 8?

6. Describe how the Psalmist felt about the “law of the Lord,” according to verse 10?

7. What is the Psalmist's prayer, according to verse 13?

8. What two things are uppermost in the Psalmist's prayer, in verse 14?

9. What verse in the Psalm has meant the most to you?

10. What lesson have you learned from this Psalm?

LESSONS FROM THE PASSAGE:

What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

LESSON #1: “The heavens declare the glory of God” but not His will.

LESSON #2: A continuous message is going forth from creation. God designed it that way.

LESSON #3: We are exalting the Creator when we magnify His creation.

LESSON #4: Creation proclaims “the glory of God.”

LESSON #5: The order and design of creation points to the indisputable evidence of a Creator.

LESSON #6: The Word of God was given for the purpose of “reviving the soul,” “making wise the simple,” “giving joy to the heart,” “giving light to the eyes,” to be “enduring forever,” and “altogether righteous.”

LESSON #7: The Word of God is “perfect,” “trustworthy,” “right,” “radiant,” “pure,” and “sure.”

LESSON #8: The Word of God is “more precious than gold” and “sweeter than honey.”

LESSON #9: The Word is God is a mirror for us to see those areas of our lives where we are living in denial and using rationalization.

LESSON #10: God gives token of His pleasure in response to our obedience.

LESSON #11: Lord, “may the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be pleasing in your sight.”

LESSON #12: Thank You Lord, that You are “my Rock and my Redeemer.”

ADDITIONAL NOTES:

STUDY NUMBER SIX - [PSALM 22:1-31](#)

NOTES

QUESTIONS:

1. Read [Psalm 22](#) and in your own words pull out the main thought of this passage.

2. What do you think of when you read the two questions of the Psalmist in [verse 1](#)?

3. What is the Psalmist’s problem, according to [verse 2](#)?

4. How did the Lord respond to the children of Israel in the past, according to [verses 4 & 5](#)?

5. What is the Psalmist’s plea, according to [verse 7](#)?

6. Read verses 14-18 and point out the parallels in these verses and the cross of the Lord Jesus.

7. Why should the Lord be praised, according to verse 24?

8. Read Philippians 2:9-11 and compare these with Psalm 22:27, 28.

9. What verse in the Psalm has meant the most to you?

10. What lesson have you learned from this Psalm?

LESSONS FROM THE PASSAGE:

What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

LESSON #1: There is no greater passage to teach us the principle of literal fulfillment of Bible prophecy than this one.

LESSON #2: The Lord Jesus Christ was forsaken by God the Father when He was made sin for us so that we would never have to experience being forsaken.

LESSON #3: In His moment of greatest humiliation, the Lord Jesus Christ says, "I am a worm, not a man, scorned by men and despised by the people."

LESSON #4: While men are mocking and hurling insults and shaking their heads at Jesus, He is praying, "Father, forgive them for they are not knowing what they are doing."

LESSON #5: I think it helps us to realize the miracle of what we are reading when we recognize these words were written a thousand years ahead of time.

LESSON #6: Jesus probably recited this whole psalm during the hours that He was hanging on the cross.

LESSON #7: Crucifixion was unknown until the time of the Roman empire and these words, "they pierced my hands and my feet," are once again miraculous.

LESSON #8: They were announcing His death ahead of time by "dividing His garments among them and casting lots for his clothing."

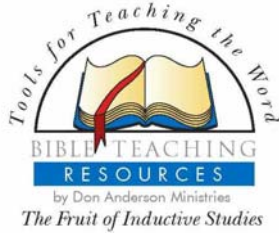
LESSON #9: Lord, help me to praise You, to honor You, and to revere You.

LESSON #10: Lord, thank You that our Savior did not stay in the grave but He has broken the bands of death and now is the ever-living Son of God.

LESSON #11: Lord, You are the theme of my praise.

LESSON #12: Lord, thank You the dominion belongs to You and that You rule over the nations.

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Part II

STUDY NUMBER SEVEN - [PSALM 23:1-6](#)

NOTES

QUESTIONS:

1. Read [Psalm 23](#) and in your own words pull out the main thought of this passage.

2. Read [Isaiah 40:11](#) and compare it with [verse 1](#) in this Psalm.

3. What two things does the Shepherd do for us, according to [verse 2](#)?

4. What two things does the Shepherd do for us, according to [verse 3](#)?

5. Why does the Psalmist have no fear in the “valley of the shadow of death,” according to verse 4?

6. What does the Shepherd do for the Psalmist in verse 5?

7. Read Ephesians 3:20 and compare it with the last phrase in verse 5, “my cup overflows.”

8. What two things will “follow him all the days of his life?”

9. What verse in the Psalm has meant the most to you?

10. What lesson have you learned from this Psalm?

LESSONS FROM THE PASSAGE:

LESSON #1: “The Lord is my shepherd” not “was” or “shall be.”

LESSON #2: The Lord is personally and intimately involved in the lives of His sheep.

LESSON #3: Because “the Lord is my shepherd, I shall not be in want.”

LESSON #4: The top three items on the Shepherd’s agenda are rest, restoration, and regulation.

LESSON #5: The good Shepherd with tender care imparts sweet repose to His weary sheep.

LESSON #6: I do not want because “he makes me lie down in green pastures, he [gently] leads me beside [restful] waters, he [refreshes] my soul,” and he regulates me in “righteous” tracks.

LESSON #7: The Lord’s presence casts out the fear of physical death because He has already been there ahead of us and done that.

LESSON #8: My Shepherd is there to “prepare a table,” to “anoint my head,” and to give me a “cup” overflowing.

LESSON #9: I do not fear because “you are with me,” “your rod and your staff comfort me,” you arrange “a table before me,” and you anointed the head of me.

LESSON #10: I am content, my cup is fullness, good fortune and grace shall pursue me, and “I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever.”

STUDY NUMBER EIGHT - [PSALM 27:1-14](#)

NOTES

QUESTIONS:

1. Read [Psalm 27](#) and in your own words pull out the main thought of this passage.

2. In what three ways is the Lord described by the Psalmist in [verse 1](#)?

3. When enemies attack him, what will be the outcome, according to [verse 2](#)?

4. What one thing does the Psalmist ask of the Lord, according to [verse 4](#)?

5. What is the Lord going to do for the Psalmist “in the day of trouble,” according to verse 5?

6. What three things does the Psalmist ask of the Lord in verse 7?

7. What three things does the Psalmist ask the Lord not to do, according to verse 9?

8. What is the Psalmist confident of, according to verse 13?

9. What verse in the Psalm has meant the most to you?

10. What lesson have you learned from this Psalm?

LESSONS FROM THE PASSAGE:

What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

LESSON #1: The normal Christian life is filled with peaks and valleys.

LESSON #2: Is the Lord your “light,” your “salvation,” and your “stronghold”?

LESSON #3: Of what and of whom are you afraid?

LESSON #4: The battle is the Lord’s and He will facilitate the victory if we will but trust in Him.

LESSON #5: Do you have that quiet confidence that God is working all these things out even if you do not understand?

LESSON #6: Can you, with David, say: “One thing I ask” and with the apostle Paul: “This one thing I do”?

LESSON #7: "In the day of trouble he will keep me safe . . . he will hide me . . . and set me high upon a rock."

LESSON #8: "Let the word of Christ richly dwell within you; with all wisdom teaching and admonishing one another with psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with thankfulness in your hearts to God" (Colossians 3:16).

LESSON #9: Is the Lord saying to you in your heart: "Seek his face"? Are you willing to respond: "Your face, Lord, I will seek"?

LESSON #10: Lord, I do not want to make any more mistakes. I have made enough already. Teach me. Lead me.

LESSON #11: "How did I get to where I am, which is so far from where I am supposed to be?" (H. Beecher Hicks)

LESSON #12: Are you still confident that you are going to see "the goodness of the Lord" in these future days?

LESSON #13: The keys to experiencing the "goodness of the Lord" are: waiting, warring, walking, and working.

LESSON #14: "Be strong and take heart and wait for the Lord."

STUDY NUMBER NINE - [PSALM 32:1-11](#)

NOTES

QUESTIONS:

1. Read Psalm 32 and in your own words pull out the main thought of this passage.

2. What four things are true of the "blessed man," according to verses 1 & 2?

3. How was the Psalmist affected when he kept silent about his sin, according to verse 3?

4. How did the Lord handle this silence about sin, according to verse 4?

5. What three things does the Psalmist say about the Lord in verse 7?

6. What two things will the Lord do for us, according to verse 8?

7. How are the wicked and the righteous contrasted in verse 10?

8. What does the Psalmist tell the righteous to do in verse 11?

9. What verse in the Psalm has meant the most to you?

10. What lesson have you learned from this Psalm?

LESSONS FROM THE PASSAGE:

What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

LESSON #1: The blessing of the Lord is for those whose “transgressions are forgiven, whose sins are covered, . . . whose sin the Lord does not count against him, and in whose spirit is no deceit.”

LESSON #2: Delay in the confession of sin brings physical consequences.

LESSON #3: "He who conceals his sins does not prosper, but whoever confesses and renounces them finds mercy" (Proverbs 28:13).

LESSON #4: It delights the heart of God for us to be honest and transparent with Him.

LESSON #5: Your heavy hand is upon us, increasing with pressure until we respond.

LESSON #6: The instant David confessed, the Lord forgave.

LESSON #7: The sin we try to "cover up" will eventually bring us down.

LESSON #8: "Test me, O Lord, and try me, examine my heart and my mind; for your love is ever before me, and I walk continually in your truth" (Psalm 26:2, 3).

LESSON #9: The day of grace will end and the time of judgment will come.

LESSON #10: Thank You, Lord, that: "You are my hiding place; you will protect me from trouble and surround me with songs of deliverance" (Psalm 32:7).

LESSON #11: Lord, thank You, that You are there to "instruct," to "teach," to "counsel," and to "watch over" us.

LESSON #12: Lord, it is my desire not to be managed by force and the severity of discipline.

LESSON #13: Thank You that Your "unfailing love surrounds the man who trusts in You."

LESSON #14: Lord, it is the longing of my heart to be obedient to You in these commands in verse 11: "Rejoice in the Lord and be glad, you righteous; sing, all you who are upright in heart!"

STUDY NUMBER TEN - PSALM 34:1-22**NOTES****QUESTIONS:**

1. Read Psalm 34 and in your own words pull out the main thought of this passage.

2. What does the Psalmist ask us to do, according to verse 3?

3. What two things did the Lord do the Psalmist, according to verse 4?

4. What two things did the Lord do for the Psalmist, according to verse 6?

5. How does the angel of the Lord respond to our times of trouble, according to verse 7?

6. What two things does the Psalmist ask us to do in verses 8 & 9?

7. "For those of us who love life and desire to see many good days," what are we told to do by the Psalmist in verses 13 & 14?

8. What is the Lord's relationship to the "broken hearted," according to verse 18?

9. What verse in the Psalm has meant the most to you?

10. What lesson have you learned from this Psalm?

LESSONS FROM THE PASSAGE:

What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

LESSON #1: Praise is appropriate always and at all times.

LESSON #2: When I praise the Lord it brings encouragement to others who are “afflicted.”

LESSON #3: It brings the Lord great joy and delight when a great company of us “glorify the Lord” and “exalt his name together.”

LESSON #4: Has the Lord delivered you from all of your “fears?”

LESSON #5: Does your face reflect the radiance and beauty of the Lord Jesus Christ?

LESSON #6: Notice the Lord did not deliver him from his troubles but delivered “him out of all his troubles.”

LESSON #7: Have you thanked the Lord recently for the angelic beings who are there to protect and to provide for you as the need arises?

LESSON #8: Have you tasted and seen that the Lord is good?

LESSON #9: The “fear of the Lord” requires my submission, obedience, and respect for the greatness of God.

LESSON #10: It is amazing what you can endure when you know you’re winning.

LESSON #11: If you are one who “loves life and desires to see many good days” then the psalmist tells us we must keep our “tongue from evil” and our “lips from speaking lies.” We must “turn from evil and do good; seek peace and pursue it.”

LESSON #12: You are really special because “the eyes of the Lord” are on you and “his ears are attentive [to your] cry.”

LESSON #13: “The Lord is close to the brokenhearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit.”

STUDY NUMBER ELEVEN - [PSALM 37:1-40](#)

NOTES

QUESTIONS:

1. Read [Psalm 37](#) and in your own words pull out the main thought of this passage.

2. What three things are we commanded to do in [verses 3-5](#)?

3. What are we commanded to do by the Psalmist in [verses 7 & 8](#)?

4. Describe the future for the “meek,” according to [verse 11](#).

5. What does the Lord do for those “He delights in,” according to [verses 23 & 24](#)?

6. How does the Lord respond to the “just” and to the “wicked,” according to [verse 28](#)?

7. What are we commanded to do in [verse 34](#)?

8. In what two ways is the Lord involved in the “life of the righteous,” according to verse 39?

9. What verse in the Psalm has meant the most to you?

10. What lesson have you learned from this Psalm?

LESSONS FROM THE PASSAGE:

What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

LESSON #1: The Lord repeats three times in this Psalm that we are not to “fret.”

LESSON #2: The main message of the Psalm is do not get upset over temporary things.
Keep your focus on that which is eternal.

LESSON #3: “Trust in the Lord and do good; dwell in the land and enjoy safe pasture.”

LESSON #4: “Delight yourself in the Lord and he will give you the desires of your heart.”

LESSON #5: “Commit your way to the Lord; trust in him and he will do this.”

LESSON #6: “Be still before the Lord and wait patiently for him.”

LESSON #7: God gives His very best to those who leave the choice with Him.

LESSON #8: Rest and rejoice, wait and see.

LESSON #9: “The meek will inherit the land and enjoy great peace.”

LESSON #10: “Refrain from anger and turn from wrath.”

LESSON #11: “The Lord laughs at the wicked, for he knows their day is coming.”

LESSON #12: “Better [is] the little that the righteous have than the wealth of many wicked.”

LESSON #13: “The wicked borrow and do not repay, but the righteous give generously.”

LESSON #14: "If the Lord delights in a man's way, he makes his steps firm."

LESSON #15: "Wait for the Lord and keep his way."

ADDITIONAL NOTES:

STUDY NUMBER TWELVE - [PSALM 40:1-17](#)

NOTES

QUESTIONS:

1. Read Psalm 40 and in your own words pull out the main thought of this passage.

2. How does the Lord respond to the Psalmist who is waiting patiently, according to verses 1-3?

3. Who is the "blessed man," according to verse 4?

4. Read verse 8 and ask yourself the questions: What is my relationship to God's will and to God's Word? Is it the same as the Psalmist?

5. Describe the Psalmist's witness, according to verse 10.

6. What does the Psalmist ask of the Lord in verse 11?

7. What two things does the Psalmist pray for in verse 16?

8. The Psalmist describes himself as “poor and needy” in verse 17, what does he ask of the Lord in this verse?

9. What verse in the Psalm has meant the most to you?

10. What lesson have you learned from this Psalm?

LESSONS FROM THE PASSAGE:

What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

LESSON #1: As David “waited patiently for the Lord,” the Lord turned to him and heard his cry.

LESSON #2: Have you fallen into one of the “pits” of sin, defeat, bad habits, circumstances, or temptation? Are you crying out to the Lord today?

LESSON #3: “Greater is he who is in you than he who is in the world” (1 John 4:4). “He will lift you out of the slimy pit and out of the mud and mire and he’ll set your feet on a rock and give you a firm place to stand.”

LESSON #4: He will even put a “new song in [your] mouth, a hymn of praise to our God.”

LESSON #5: Have you ever really thought much about how the circumstances in your life are impacting others to “see and fear and put their trust in the Lord”?

LESSON #6: “Blessed is the man who makes the Lord his trust.”

LESSON #7: “Wonders” and “troubles without number” are a part of the normal Christian life.

LESSON #8: Lord, as an act of worship, I present my body afresh to You for You to use as You please.

LESSON #9: Lord, “your law is within my heart” and my supreme desire is to do Your will.

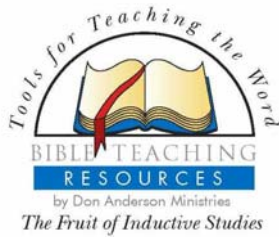
LESSON #10: Lord, help me not to be guilty of “sealing my lips,” “hiding your righteousness,” or “concealing your love.”

1. Read Psalms 42 and 43 and in your own words pull out the main thought of this passage.

3. What words does David use in verse 5 to describe his condition?

LESSON #8: David asks the Lord for three things in Psalm 43:1: (1) “Vindicate me;” (2) “plead my cause;” and (3) “rescue me.”

LESSON #9: Can you say to the Lord today: “You are God my stronghold . . .” (Psalm 43:2)?

LESSON #10: The key to solving the problem of depression is in Psalm 43:3: “Send forth your light and your truth.”

LESSON #11: There are two reasons for “light” and “truth”: (1) “let them guide me;” and (2) “let them bring me to your holy mountain” (Psalm 43:3).

LESSON #12: Can you say to God: “You are my joy and my delight” (Psalm 43:4)?

LESSON #7: The Lord “desires truth in the inner parts” and He wants to “teach me wisdom in the inmost place” (verse 6).

LESSON #9: “A pure heart,” “a steadfast spirit,” and “a willing spirit,” are the three things that David prays for (verses 10 & 12).

LESSON #10: In response to forgiveness, David will “teach transgressors” the Lord’s ways (verse 13).

LESSON #11: “O Lord, open my lips, and my mouth will declare your praise” (verse 15).

LESSON #12: “The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise” (verse 17).

LESSON #9: Thank You, Lord, that You have the power and the authority to still the raging seas and also "the turmoil [among] nations" (verse 7).

LESSON #10: The Lord is the One who is "call[ing] forth songs of joy" from us (verse 8).

LESSON #11: Lord, as "You care for the land . . . you enrich it . . . and provide the people with grain," so you likewise do those very same things for us. You "care" for us, You "enrich" us, and You "provide" for our needs (verse 9).

LESSON #12: "Sow to yourself in righteousness, reap in mercy, break up your unplowed ground for it is time to seek the Lord till he comes and rains righteousness upon you" (Hosea 10:12).

LESSON #13: Lord, what great comfort comes from seeing these beautiful scenes of Your future kingdom. Even so, come quickly!

LESSON #14: “Bounty” and “abundance” are words that describe Your blessing upon a person who is walking with You (verse 11).

LESSON #10: “Teach us to number our days aright, that we may gain a heart of wisdom” (verse 12).

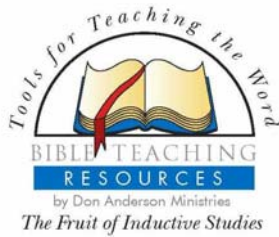
LESSON #11: “Satisfy us [O Lord] with your unfailing love, that we may sing for joy and be glad all our days” (verse 14).

LESSON #3: Satan is busily engaged in mining the path before us with snares and traps to keep us from making progress in the path of obedience.

LESSON #4: “Because of the Lord’s great love we are not consumed, for his compassions never fail. They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness” (Lamentations 3:22, 23).

LESSON #5: On the field of battle it is good for us to remember that the battle is the Lords.

LESSON #6: "Whatever happens, abide steadfast in a determination to cling simply to God" (St. Francis DeSales).

LESSON #7: "I am immortal until the will of God for me is accomplished" (David Livingstone).

LESSON #8: "The center of God's will is our only safety" (Betsie Ten Boom).

LESSON #9: There are three key statements in the Lord's plan of protection: (1) "it will not come near you" (verse 7); (2) "no harm will befall you" (verse 10); and (3) "no disaster will come near your tent" (verse 10).

LESSON #10: The Lord uses angels to guard us in all of our ways.

LESSON #11: Victory over Satan is our legacy as we depend upon the Lord because "greater is He who is in you than he who is in the world" (1 John 4:4).

LESSON #12: The ultimate victory over Satan is Romans 16:20: "And the God of peace will soon crush Satan under your feet. . . ."

LESSON #13: The Lord's contract of protection involves eight things: (1) "I will rescue him"; (2) "I will protect him"; (3) "I will answer him"; (4) "I will be with him in trouble"; (5) "I will deliver him"; (6) "[I will] honor him"; (7) "[I will] satisfy him"; and (8) "[I will] show him my salvation."

LESSON #14: "God never goes back on the man who stakes his all on Him" (William Barclay).

LESSON #5: “From the rising of the sun to the place where it sets, the name of the Lord is to be praised” (verse 3).

LESSON #6: “His brilliant splendor fills the heavens, and the earth is filled with his praise! What a wonderful God he is!” (Habakkuk 3:3b NLT).

LESSON #7: “The Lord is exalted over all the nations, his glory above the heavens” (verse 4).

LESSON #8: He “sits enthroned on high,” He “stoops down to look on the heavens and the earth,” “He raises the poor from the dust,” He “lifts the needy from the ash heap,” “he seats them with princes,” “He settles the barren woman in her home as a happy mother of children” (verses 5-9).

LESSON #9: “Truly, truly, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains by itself alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit” (John 12:24).

LESSON #4: David has experienced an incredible answer to prayer.

LESSON #5: The answer to prayer has made him “bold and stouthearted” (verse 3).

LESSON #6: His wish is that the impact of what the Lord has done for him will affect the “kings of the earth” so that they, too, enter into a chorus of praise to the Lord (verse 4).

LESSON #7: Although the “glory of the Lord is great,” “he looks [with concern] upon the lowly” (verses 5 & 6).

LESSON #8: The Lord does not have a relationship with the “proud” (verse 6).

LESSON #9: Lord, it is wonderful to know that in the “midst of trouble,” You are there with us (verse 7).

LESSON #10: What a joy is ours to know that You will “fulfill Your purpose” for us (verse 8).

LESSON #11: You will “not abandon the works of your hands” (verse 8).

LESSONS FROM THE PASSAGE:

LESSON #1: David held nothing back in his “cry aloud to the Lord” (verse 1).

LESSON #2: Verbalizing our prayers sometimes helps us to keep our thoughts on track.

LESSON #3: “Our lives are shaped not as much by our experiences as by our expectations” (George Bernard Shaw).

LESSON #4: David was honest and transparent in prayer as he poured out his “complaints” and his “troubles” to the Lord (verse 2).

LESSON #5: There are going to be times in our Christian experience when our “spirit [will grow] faint within [us]” (verse 3).

LESSON #6: There are three things that bring David a lot of joy in this Psalm: (1) “it is you who know my way”—verse 3; (2) “You are my refuge, my portion in the land of the living”—verse 5; and (3) “Set me free from my prison, that I may praise your name. Then the righteous will gather about me because of your goodness to me” (verse 7).

LESSON #7: “The path of the righteous is like the first gleam of dawn, shining ever brighter till the full light of day” (Proverbs 4:18).

LESSON #8: Lord, although David can see no one who is “concerned” for him, “no refuge,” and “no one cares for [his] life,” yet he has the promise we all have. You will never leave us nor forsake us (verse 4).

LESSON #9: Thank you, Lord, that You are our “refuge” and that You are our “portion in the land of the living” (verses 4 & 5).

LESSON #10: Lord, it is a joy to know that when we are in desperate need and the enemy is too strong, Your strength is made perfect in our weakness.

LESSON #11: "Set me free from my prison, that I may praise your name" (verse 7).

STUDY NUMBER TWENTY-FOUR – [PSALM 146:1-10](#)

NOTES

QUESTIONS:

1. Read Psalm 146 and in your own words pull out the main thought of this passage.

2. What does the psalmist say he is going to do "as long as he lives," according to verses 1 & 2?

3. What does the psalmist tell us not to do, according to verse 3?

4. Describe "death" according to the psalmist in verse 4.

5. What two things characterize "the blessed," according to verse 5?

6. How is the Lord described by the psalmist in verse 6?

7. Make a list of the things the Lord does in verses 7-9.

8. How is the Lord pictured by the psalmist in verse 10?

9. What verse in the psalm has meant the most to you?

10. What lesson have you learned from this psalm?

LESSONS FROM THE PASSAGE:

What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

LESSON #1: It ought to be our supreme desire and deepest ambition to continually “Praise the Lord” (verse 1).

LESSON #2: “I will praise the Lord all my life” (verse 2).

LESSON #3: “I will sing praise to my God as long as I live” (verse 2).

LESSON #4: Lord, my trust is in You and You alone!

LESSON #5: Lord, help me never to hear, “Thou fool, this night thy soul shall be required of thee, then whose shall those things be?” (Luke 12:20 KJV)

LESSON #6: A person is “blessed . . . whose help is the God of Jacob, [and] whose hope is in the Lord his God” (verse 5).

LESSON #7: The Lord is “the Maker of heaven and earth, the sea, and everything in them” (verse 6).

LESSON #8: “The Lord . . . remains faithful forever” (verse 6).

LESSON #9: The Lord “upholds,” “gives,” “sets . . . free,” “lifts up,” “loves,” “watches over,” and He “sustains” (verses 7-9).

LESSON #10: "He frustrates the way of the wicked" (verse 9).

LESSON #11: The Lord has reigned, is reigning, and will continue to reign forever
(verse 10).

ADDITIONAL NOTES:
