STUDY NUMBER ONE—2 Samuel 12:24,25

1 Chronicles 22:2-19

1 Chronicles 28:1-21

TEXT:

A. 2 Samuel 12:24,25

- <u>v. 24</u> Then David comforted his wife Bathsheba, and he went to her and lay with her. She gave birth to a son, and they named him Solomon. The Lord loved him;
- v. 25 and because the Lord loved him, he sent word through Nathan the prophet to name him Jedidiah.

B. 1 Chronicles 22:2-19

- <u>v. 2</u> So David gave orders to assemble the aliens living in Israel, and from among them he appointed stonecutters to prepare dressed stone for building the house of God.
- <u>v. 3</u> He provided a large amount of iron to make nails for the doors of the gateways and for the fittings, and more bronze than could be weighed.
- <u>v. 4</u> He also provided more cedar logs than could be counted, for the Sidonians and Tyrians had brought large numbers of them to David.
- <u>v. 5</u> David said, "My son Solomon is young and inexperienced, and the house to be built for the Lord should be of great magnificence and fame and splendor in the sight of all the nations. Therefore I will make preparations for it." So David made extensive preparations before his death.
- <u>v. 6</u> Then he called for his son Solomon and charged him to build a house for the Lord, the God of Israel.
- <u>v. 7</u> David said to Solomon: "My son, I had it in my heart to build a house for the Name of the Lord my God.
- <u>v. 8</u> But this word of the Lord came to me: 'You have shed much blood and have fought many wars. You are not to build a house for my Name, because you have shed much blood on the earth in my sight.

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- <u>v. 9</u> But you will have a son who will be a man of peace and rest, and I will give him rest from all his enemies on every side. His name will be Solomon, and I will grant Israel peace and quiet during his reign.
- <u>v. 10</u> He is the one who will build a house for my Name. He will be my son, and I will be his father. And I will establish the throne of his kingdom over Israel forever.'
- v. 11 "Now, my son, the Lord be with you, and may you have success and build the house of the Lord your God, as he said you would.
- <u>v. 12</u> May the Lord give you discretion and understanding when He puts you in command over Israel, so that you may keep the law of the Lord your God.
- <u>v. 13</u> Then you will have success if you are careful to observe the decrees and laws that the Lord gave Moses for Israel. Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid or discouraged.
- <u>v. 14</u> "I have taken great pains to provide for the temple of the Lord a hundred thousand talents of gold, a million talents of silver, quantities of bronze and iron too great to be weighed, and wood and stone. And you may add to them.
- v. 15 You have many workmen: stonecutters, masons and carpenters, as well as men skilled in every kind of work
- v. 16 in gold and silver, bronze and iron-craftsmen beyond number. Now begin the work, and the Lord be with you."
- v. 17 Then David ordered all the leaders of Israel to help his son Solomon.
- <u>v. 18</u> He said to them, "Is not the Lord your God with you? And has he not granted you rest on every side? For he has handed the inhabitants of the land over to me, and the land is subject to the Lord and to his people.
- <u>v. 19</u> Now devote your heart and soul to seeking the Lord your God. Begin to build the sanctuary of the Lord God, so that you may bring the ark of the covenant of the Lord and the sacred articles belonging to God into the temple that will be built for the Name of the Lord."

C. 1 Chronicles 28:1-21

- <u>v. 1</u> David summoned all the officials of Israel to assemble at Jerusalem: the officers over the tribes, the commanders of the divisions in the service of the king, the commanders of thousands and commanders of hundreds, and the officials in charge of all the property and livestock belonging to the king and his sons, together with the palace officials, the mighty men and all the brave warriors.
- <u>v. 2</u> King David rose to his feet and said: "Listen to me, my brothers and my people. I had it in my heart to build a house as a place of rest for the ark of the covenant of the Lord, for the footstool of our God, and I made plans to build it.
- <u>v. 3</u> But God said to me, 'You are not to build a house for my Name, because you are a warrior and have shed blood.'

- <u>v. 4</u> "Yet the Lord, the God of Israel, chose me from my whole family to be king over Israel forever. He chose Judah as leader, and from the house of Judah he chose my family, and from my father's sons he was pleased to make me king over all Israel.
- <u>v. 5</u> Of all my sons--and the Lord has given me many--he has chosen my son Solomon to sit on the throne of the kingdom of the Lord over Israel.
- <u>v. 6</u> He said to me: 'Solomon your son is the one who will build my house and my courts, for I have chosen him to be my son, and I will be his father.
- <u>v. 7</u> I will establish his kingdom forever if he is unswerving in carrying out my commands and laws, as is being done at this time.'
- <u>v. 8</u> "So now I charge you in the sight of all Israel and of the assembly of the Lord, and in the hearing of our God: Be careful to follow all the commands of the Lord your God, that you may possess this good land and pass it on as an inheritance to your descendants forever.
- <u>v. 9</u> "And you, my son Solomon, acknowledge the God of your father, and serve him with wholehearted devotion and with a willing mind, for the Lord searches every heart and understands every motive behind the thoughts. If you seek him, he will be found by you; but if you forsake him, he will reject you forever.
- <u>v. 10</u> Consider now, for the Lord has chosen you to build a temple as a sanctuary. Be strong and do the work."
- <u>v. 11</u> Then David gave his son Solomon the plans for the portico of the temple, its buildings, its storerooms, its upper parts, its inner rooms and the place of atonement.
- <u>v. 12</u> He gave him the plans of all that the Spirit had put in his mind for the courts of the temple of the Lord and all the surrounding rooms, for the treasuries of the temple of God and for the treasuries for the dedicated things.
- <u>v. 13</u> He gave him instructions for the divisions of the priests and Levites, and for all the work of serving in the temple of the Lord, as well as for all the articles to be used in its service.
- <u>v. 14</u> He designated the weight of gold for all the gold articles to be used in various kinds of service, and the weight of silver for all the silver articles to be used in various kinds of service:
- <u>v. 15</u> the weight of gold for the gold lampstands and their lamps, with the weight for each lampstand and its lamps; and the weight of silver for each silver lampstand and its lamps, according to the use of each lampstand;
- <u>v. 16</u> the weight of gold for each table for consecrated bread; the weight of silver for the silver tables;
- v. 17 the weight of pure gold for the forks, sprinkling bowls and pitchers; the weight of gold for each gold dish; the weight of silver for each silver dish;
- <u>v. 18</u> and the weight of the refined gold for the altar of incense. He also gave him the plan for the chariot, that is, the cherubim of gold that spread their wings and shelter the ark of the covenant of the Lord.
- <u>v. 19</u> "All this," David said, "I have in writing from the hand of the Lord upon me, and he gave me understanding in all the details of the plan."

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<u>v. 20</u> David also said to Solomon his son, "Be strong and courageous, and do the work. Do not be afraid or discouraged, for the Lord God, my God, is with you. He will not fail you or forsake you until all the work for the service of the temple of the Lord is finished.

<u>v. 21</u> The divisions of the priests and Levites are ready for all the work on the temple of God, and every willing man skilled in any craft will help you in all the work. The officials and all the people will obey your every command."

It is certainly NO FAULT OF THE LORD'S when we FAIL TO FINISH. He HAS MADE EVERY PROVISION for us to FINISH WELL

DETERIORATION

Solomon's life reminds me of the swing of a pendulum. Smooth and graceful . . . silent and elegant . . . yet periodically given to extremes.

Born with a silver spoon in his mouth, blessed with blue blood and an abundance of brains, he was a natural for the throne. As the heir-apparent, he was tutored at the feet of godly Nathan, groomed by the beautiful Bathsheba, shaped under the watchful eye of David, and polished by the hand of God. The stamp of excellence was upon young Solomon.

Wisdom, loyalty, diplomacy, and efficiency marked his attitude and acts during the early years of his reign. Best of all, "Solomon loved the Lord" (1 Kings 3:3). His achievements could not be listed on ten pages this size. When visited by surrounding magistrates, he was viewed with awe. And rich? Multiplied millions annually. And creative? He was an architect, songwriter, artist, author, and investor of unparalleled ability.

Things slowly began to change, however, as the pendulum began its tragic swing. Farther and farther . . . and farther.

Solomon seized the reins of wrong and drove his glistening chariot of gold onto the misty flats of licentiousness, pride, lust, profanity, and paganism. Silently, gradually, like eroding soil near the banks of a deep, angry river, he began to believe the lie that has captured many a top executive . . . or super salesperson . . . or successful physician . . . or athletic prima donna . . . or film star . . . or TV celebrity.

In the eloquent words of one biographer: "Solomon . . . drove too fast and traveled too far . . . the monarch became debauched and

that may prove difficult to accurately attribute.

effeminate; an egotist and cynic, so satiated with the sensual and material affairs of life that he became skeptical of all good."

Materialism, polygamy, brutality, and idolatry now crippled his steps. Revolts fractured his nation and irrational decisions characterized his rule. All to him became "vanity and striving after the wind" (Eccl. 2:26). Nothing satisfied him any longer. The normal, Godgiven drives lost their appeal as deterioration took its final toll. And when death finally came, Solomon left in his wake a confused following and a broken, rebellious family.

Deterioration is never loud. Never obvious. Seldom even noticed. Like tiny cracks in a stucco wall, it hardly seems worth our time and attention. Never sudden.

Character threads don't "suddenly" snap. No building "suddenly" crumbles. No church "suddenly" splits. No professional "suddenly" compromises. No husband or wife "suddenly" cheats. No nation "suddenly" dissolves. No business "suddenly" becomes mediocre. As the British expositor of yesteryear, F. B. Meyer, once put it, "No man suddenly becomes base."

Slowly, silently, subtly, things are tolerated that once were rejected. At the outset everything appears harmless, maybe even a bit exciting. But with it comes an "insignificant" wedge, a gap that grows wider as moral erosion joins hands with spiritual decay.

Be on guard! Those of us who stand must take heed lest we fall. The pitfalls are still present. Still real.

The stones that make us stumble are still there: silver, sex, sloth, and self.

They wait in silence. As unobtrusive as the ticking of a clock. As attractive as the swinging of a pendulum . . . until . . . pp. 542-3

When a trout rising to a fly gets hooked on a line and finds himself unable to swim about freely, he begins with a fight which results in struggles and splashes and sometimes an escape. Often, of course, the situation is too tough for him.

In the same way the human being struggles with his environment and with the hooks that catch him. Sometimes he masters his difficulties; sometimes they are too much for him. His struggles are all that the world sees and it naturally misunderstands them. It is hard for a free fish to understand what is happening to a hooked one.

So we can expect to encounter at least three major ambushes as we attempt to finish strong.

They are

- the ambush of another woman
- the ambush of money
- the ambush of a neglected family

Think through some of the men in Scripture who should have finished strong but didn't. How about Solomon. David's son? Solomon got ambushed by women. He had over seven hundred wives and three hundred concubines. No wonder he didn't finish strong. He was exhausted.

He was ambushed by money (his wealth could not even be counted), and he was ambushed by family (his foreign wives turned his heart against the Lord; see 1 Kings 11:1-8). His son Rehoboam was such a poor leader that within days of his taking the throne to replace the deceased Solomon, the people revolted and ultimately split the nation. I get the feeling Solomon didn't spend a lot of time with Rehoboam.

Although the transition is both somber and serious, some have attempted to inject some levity into the discussion. - PESSIMISTIC,

- STINGY, and
- STUBBORN.

Alexander Whyte says:

If ever ship set sail on a sunny morning, but all that was left of her was a board or two on the shore that night, that ship was Solomon. A board or two of rare and precious wood, indeed; and some of them richly worked and overlaid with silver and gold—it was Solomon with his sermons, and his prayers, and his proverbs, and his songs, and his temple. If ever a blazing lighthouse was set up in the sea of life to warn every man and to teach every man, it was Solomon. pp. 278-79

J. Sidlow Baxter says:

Solomon is a figure of striking interest in three ways—historically, personally, and typically.

Viewed historically, his special interest lies in the fact that he represents the peak period of Israel's prosperity as a kingdom. His reign marks the most splendid and affluent period of Hebrew history. No doubt can be left in our minds; even by a superficial reading of chapters ix. And x., that Solomon's riches and Israel's abundance at the time were such as to become a marvel both then and now. "Solomon in all his glory" has become, indeed, the classic figure of royal opulence. But besides this, Solomon is of historical interest as being the last of the kings to reign over a united Hebrew kingdom. It was through Solomon's own disobedience that the disruption took place, as we have seen; and there never will be a king reigning over a united Hebrew kingdom again until Christ Himself returns as David's Son and Lord.

Lockyer says:

Solomon, the ardent capitalist, had fine qualities of the mind and a certain amount of spirituality, but these broke down under or were undermined by greed, success, luxury and idolatry.

He says further:

Comparing the three great kings of the United Kingdom, Dr. F. Tuck gives us this interesting note—

Saul was self-willed; David was self-subdued; Solomon was self-contained. The religion of Saul was associational; the religion of David was personal; the religion of Solomon was official.

The story my be read in yet another light. Man is a composite being, and each man has to decide which part of himself shall rule the whole. Saul made the body rule; David made the heart rule; and Solomon made the mind rule. So these first three kings illustrate primary religious truths for all the ages.

PASSAGE NUMBER ONE: 2 Samuel 12:24,25

As the scene of our study opens, David and Bathesheba have experienced the judgment of God upon their relationship. This involved the death of their first born son.

2 Samuel 12:18

On the seventh day the child died. David's servants were afraid to tell him that the child was dead, for they thought, "While the child was still living, we spoke to David, but he would not listen to us. How can we tell him the child is dead? He may do something desperate."

The servants are surprised however, when David finds out about the death of the boy. <u>verse 20</u> and following says:

Then David got up from the ground. After he had washed, put on lotions and changed his clothes, he went into the house of the Lord and worshipped. Then he went to his own house, and at his request, they served him food, and he ate.

The servants quizzed him about his change of spirit, and in <u>verse 22</u> David answered;

"While the child was still alive I fasted and wept, I thought, 'Who knows? The Lord may be gracious and let the child live. But now that he is dead, why should I fast? Can I bring him back again? I will go to him, but he will not return to me."

The VERSES THAT WE ARE CONSIDERING are <u>2 Samuel 12:24,25</u>:

- v. 24 Then David comforted his wife Bathsheba, and he went to her and lay with her. She gave birth to a son, and they named him Solomon. The Lord loved him;
- v. 25 and because the Lord loved him, he sent word through Nathan the prophet to name him Jedidiah.

<u>Isaiah 55:7</u> comes to mind (King James Version)

Let the wicked forsake his way and the evil man his thoughts. Let him turn to the Lord, and He will have mercy on him, and to our God, for He will freely pardon.

The Bible Knowledge Commentary says:

Eventually another son was born to David and Bathsheba, one who bore a double name. Called Solomon ("peace") by them, the Lord . . . through Nathan named him Jedidiah ("loved by the Lord").
p. 468

Voss observes:

A postscript to this judgment scene is a note about the second pregnancy of Bathsheba and her comforting by a replacement for the son she had lost. The child was named Solomon, meaning "peaceable" or "a man of peace."

That was not the end of the matter, however. Nathan came apparently on Yahweh's instructions, to name the child Jedediah (meaning "beloved of Yahweh") because "Yaweh loved him" (12:25 JB). When one considers all that has gone before, it is a remarkable act of divine grace that God should show such favor to Solomon and that in His sovereignty He should choose him as the next king of Israel. But then, why did God choose Jacob instead of Esau or David as the youngest of the family? His sovereign ways often are beyond human comprehension.

Lange, in his commentary says:

When we have allowed the Lord's chastening to promote our welfare and peace, and are holding still before the Lord, even if we see around us nothing but suffering and trouble, then the Lord takes us up again and blesses us and gives us twofold for all the hardness we have had to endure. The Lord blesses much more willingly than He chastens. His fatherly hands had much rather open in beneficence than in affliction. p. 479

Patrick & Loweth says:

Such is the wonderful goodness of God to truly penitent sinners, who testify the sincerity of their repentance by humble submission to whatsoever punishments God thinks fit to inflict upon them (as David did to the death of the former child), and thereby incline the Divine goodness to show further mercy to them.

p. 238

Having experienced forgiveness, life must go on. All the tears and mourning are not going to change things.

With the birth of their son,

they "NAMED HIM SOLOMON", which means "peaceful",

"AND BECAUSE THE LORD LOVED HIM. HE SENT WORD THROUGH NATHAN THE PROPHET TO NAME HIM JEDIDIAH"

which means "the delight of Jehovah", "the beloved of Jehovah". The proud grandfather probably called him "JED" for short.

Theodore Epp says:

Surely this is an indication of God's complete forgiveness of David and a fresh evidence of God's mercy. On the one hand, we see the severity of God, and on the other we see his grace, since the lesson he taught his child has been learned.

(source unknown)

Mackintosh says:

Yet what grace shines out in this, as in every scene of David's remarkable career. Bathsheba becomes the mother of Solomon, who occupied the throne of Israel in its most glorious period, and who also stands in that privileged line through which, according to the flesh, Christ came. This is truly divine. It is altogether worthy of God. The darkest scene in David's life becomes under the hand of God the means of richest blessings. Divine grace is reflected on a dark background. (source unknown)

In order for us to get a little bit of a feel about the family that SOLOMON has been born, we need to go back and LOOK AT THE RECORD of David's life.

We read in <u>1 Chronicles 3</u>, beginning in <u>verse 1</u>:

These were the sons of David born to him in Hebron:

The firstborn was AMNON the son of Ahinoam of Jezreel;

the second, DANIEL the son of Abigail of Carmel;

the third, ABSALOM the son of Maacah daughter of Talmai king of Geshur;

the fourth, ADONIJAH the son of Haggith;

the fifth, SHEPHATIAH the son of Abital;

and the sixth, ITHREAM by his wife Eglah.

These SIX were born to David in Hebron, where he reigned seven years and six months.

David reigned in Jerusalem thirty-three years, and these were the children born to him there:

SHAMMUA, SHOBAB, NATHAN and SOLOMON. These FOUR were by Bathsheba daughter of Ammiel. There were also IBHAR, ELISHUA, ELPELET, NOGAH, NEPHEG, JAPHIA, ELISHAMA, ELIADA and ELIPHET—nine in all. All these were the SONS OF DAVID, besides his sons by his concubines. And TAMAR was their sister.

Tamar was born to Maacah the daughter of Talmai king of Geshur.

WHAT AN INCREDIBLE SET OF CIRCUMSTANCES FOR YOUNG SOLOMON TO BE BORN INTO!

First of all, DAVID HAS "SIX SONS" of six wives.

Then HE HAS "FOUR" sons by "BATHSHEBA".

and then" NINE MORE SONS" of unspecified wives,

and he has "SONS BY CONCUBINES."

We know ten of these concubines he left behind that were left behind that were defiled by Absalom in his uprising.

I HAVE A PERSONAL FEELING that Solomon became the man that he became, not so much because of David and Bathsheba, but because of his relationship to Nathan the prophet.

Let us turn our attention to the

REMAINING TWO PASSAGES IN OUR STUDY IN 1 Chronicles.

We will look FIRST at 1CHRONICLES 22:2-19.

TAKING CARE OF BUSINESS

We have moved ahead in out story some fifteen to twenty years. David is at the end of his reign and his life. His son, Solomon is in his late teens or early twenties at the most.

1 Chronicles 22

<u>v. 2</u> So David gave orders to assemble the aliens living in Israel, and from among them he appointed stonecutters to prepare dressed stone for building the house of God.

Selman observes:

From now until the end of Chronicles' account of David, everything will be directly concerned with the temple. The context also shifts from David alone to David and Solomon, since the building of the temple is really a joint project.

Delitzsch says:

Of these preparations our chapter treats, and in it we have an account how David provided the necessary labour and materials for the building of the temple (vers.2-5), committed the execution of the work in a solemn way to his son Solomon (vers.6-16), and called upon the chiefs of the people to give him their support in the work (vers.17-19). p. 243

David in his old age is still functioning very effectively. We see this in the verbs:

"SO DAVID GAVE ORDERS", "HE APPOINTED", "HE PROVIDED".

(As Iron Sharpens Iron by Howard & William Hendricks)

I'm afraid a similar thing is happening today. Statistically speaking, men are living longer than ever-an average of about 78 years for white males. But for many, while their days are lengthened, their influence is not. Instead of going out in a blaze of glory, they are dying "inch by inch playing silly little games," as one poet has so aptly described it. Is that the case for you? As you wrap up your life, are you frittering away day after day in the pursuit of silly little games? Or are you preparing your posterity to take over after you're gone?

p. 227

In this way, some of us are robbing our children's future. In fact, when I look around at the men approaching their senior years today, I have to confess that I see a lot more Hezekiahs than I do Calebs. There are a lot more guys opting for comfort and ease than there are helping the next generation conquer new territory. I say that to our shame; I wish it were otherwise.

When men get old, they start to think about what they will leave behind, and to whom they will give it. They make out a will and designate the beneficiaries. Who will get their money? What will happen to their houses? Who will inherit their personal property--their books, their collections, their tools, their trophies? If they've had a business, who will take it over? Men hire lawyers and spend countless hours putting their affairs in order.

Of David filled with a flurry of activity, putting together a project that he will not see through to fruition, but he will clear the decks, and get everything ready for his son, Solomon.

v. 5 David said, "My son Solomon is young and inexperienced and the house to be built for the Lord should be of great magnificence and fame and splendor in the sight of all the nations. Therefore I will make preparations for it." So David made extensive preparations before his death.

David throughout the remainder of these passages refers over and over again to Solomon as "MY SON"

In my mind it takes me back to that sad, sad time in David's life, when Absalom has been killed on the field of battle, and we read in

2 Samuel 18:33

The king was shaken. He went up to the room over the gateway and wept. As he went he said "O, my son, Absalom! My son, my son, Absalom! If only I had died instead of you—O Absalom, my son, my son!"

David REMINDS the leaders that:

"HIS SON SOLOMON IS YOUNG AND INEXPERIENCED" and
"THE HOUSE TO BE BUILT FOR THE LORD SHOULD BE"

CHARACTERIZED IN THREE WAYS:

- "A HOUSE OF GREAT MAGNIFICENCE,"
- "A HOUSE OF FAME," and
- "A HOUSE OF SPLENDOR."

Delitzsch says:

Solomon could not then be quite twenty years old, as he was born only after the Syro-Ammonite war. p. 244

Lockyer says much the same thing:

When he succeeded his father he was "young and tender," perhaps about 20 years of age, and reigned for 40 years.
p. 111

DAVID SAYS at the CONCLUSION of verse 5:

"THEREFORE, I WILL MAKE PREPARATIONS FOR IT. SO DAVID MADE EXTENSIVE PREPARATIONS BEFORE HIS DEATH."

What an example of a person who lives life FULL TO THE FINISH. He is still making investments that will outlive him. He is FACILITATING THE FUTURE.

Parker says:

If we cannot do all, we will do nothing; if we cannot build, we will not prepare; if we cannot have the honour of putting up the temple, we certainly will not assist any other man to erect it—This would have been peevishness, selfishness, the veriest meanness of soul. David, on the other hand, consented to the Lord's arrangement, and did all that lay in his power to facilitate the progress of his son.—We should work up to the very moment of our death.—Our last breath should, if possible, help some other man to pray better, or work more, or suffer with a firmer constancy.

p. 146

John 4:38

"I sent you to reap that which you haven't labored. Others have labored and you have entered into their labor."

Give me such a oneness with the Father that his dreams would be my dreams. That his will would be my will. That his words would be my words. And that the driving ambition in my life would be to please him. p. 33

AND NOW his prayer for his son in verse 12 is TWOFOLD:

DAVID'S PRAYER for his son in verse 11 is "May you have success"

"MAY THE LORD GIVE YOU DISCRETION AND UNDERSTANDING"

"WHEN HE PUTS YOU IN COMMAND OVER ISRAEL."

Psalm 75:6,7

No one from the east or the west or from the desert can exalt a man. But it is God who judges: He brings one down, He exalts another.

The REASON David prays is:

"THAT THE LORD WILL GIVE HIM DISCRETION AND UNDERSTANDING":

ALSO,

"SO THAT YOU MAY KEEP THE LAW OF THE LORD YOUR GOD."

1Chronicles 22

v. 13 Then you will have success if you are careful to observe the decrees and laws that the Lord gave Moses for Israel. Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid or discouraged.

In <u>verse 11</u> he is praying "May you have success", and in <u>verse 13</u> he says

"THEN YOU WILL HAVE SUCCESS IF YOU ARE CAREFUL TO OBSERVE THE DECREES AND LAWS THAT THE LORD GAVE MOSES FOR ISRAEL."

David is passing the PASSION OF HIS HEART on to his son.

There are FOUR THINGS he says to Solomon in this next charge,

TWO POSITIVE, and TWO NEGATIVE.

TWO POSITIVE:

"BE STRONG"

"BE COURAGEOUS"

TWO NEGATIVE:

"DO NOT BE AFRAID"

"DO NOT BE DISCOURAGED."

Sounds so much like when the Lord speaks to Joshua, in

Joshua 1:9 (King James Version)

"Have I not commanded you to be strong and courageous, do not be terrified, do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go."

DON'T BE A WISHY WASHY WIMP.

GET UP TO THE PLATE AND TAKE YOUR SWINGS!

Parker says:

We have read that Solomon was young and tender, young and timid; it would seem as if David, recognising the timidity of his son, specially charged him to cultivate courage, bravery, fearlessness. This was training up a child in the way he should go. We are too fond of training our strongest faculties, and thus we are tempted to neglect the weaker side of our nature. Find out the weak side of a child's character, and address yourselves assiduously to its cultivation. We should seek to fill the empty sac, not to overcrowd the full one.

p. 149

Stop singing "Standing on the Promises" while you're sitting on the premises. Get with the program. GO FOR THE GOLD!!

v. 17 Then David ordered all the leaders of Israel to help his son Solomon.

David, the old war horse, is still functioning effectively.

Back in verse 2, "HE GAVE ORDERS" and "HE APPOINTED".

In verse 3,"HE PROVIDED".

NOW, in verse 17, HE:

"ORDERED ALL THE LEADERS OF ISRAEL TO HELP HIS SON SOLOMON."

v. 18 He said to them, "Is not the Lord your God with you? And has He not granted you rest on every side? For He has handed the inhabitants of the land over to me, and the land is subject to the Lord and to His people."

Two QUESTIONS he asks of them:

QUESTION #1:

"IS NOT THE LORD YOUR GOD WITH YOU?" Yes.

QUESTION #2:

"HAS HE NOT GRANTED YOU REST ON EVERY SIDE?" Yes.

David recognizes that the FATHER is SOVEREIGN, and that HIS PROGRAM AND PURPOSE will go on without him in the days that are just ahead.

In a solemn address he designated Solomon as his divinely chosen successor on the throne, and exhorted him to keep the commandments of God, to serve the Lord with devoted heart, and to build Him a house for a sanctuary (xxviii. 1-10). He then committed to Solomon the sketches and plans for the sacred buildings and sacred objects of various sorts, with the confident promise that he, by the help of God, and with the cooperation of the priests and of the people, would complete the work (vers. 11-21). pp. 289-90

JUST LIKE DAVID WAS CHOSEN from all the sons of Jesse to be the one who would

"SIT ON THE THRONE OF THE KINGDOM OF THE LORD OVER ISRAEL."

Finally, the eighth born child was the one who was tending the sheep. David was "CHOSEN" to be the king over Israel. And now the mantle is being passed on to one of his sons, Solomon.

- v. 6 He said to me: 'Solomon your son is the one who will build my house and my courts, for I have chosen him to be my son and I will be his father.'
- v. 7 I will establish his kingdom forever if he is unswerving in carrying out my command and laws, as is being done at this time.

There is a CONDITION upon the ESTABLISHMENT OF HIS KINGDOM FOREVER in these words that were not included in the words to Solomon in our previous passage.

HERE the CONDITION is:

"IF HE IS UNSWERVING IN CARRYING OUT MY COMMANDS AND LAWS, AS IS BEING DONE AT THIS TIME."

v. 8 So now I charge you in the sight of all Israel and of the assembly of the Lord, and in the hearing of our God: Be careful to follow all the commands of the Lord your God, that you may possess this good land and pass it on as an inheritance to your descendants forever.

Back in the previous passage we read in <u>1 Chronicles 22:6</u>:

"Then he called for his son Solomon and charged him to build a house for the Lord, the God of Israel."

Now speaking to this austere and distinguished group of leaders that represent every branch of the government, HE GIVES HIM THIS CHARGE:

"SO NOW I CHARGE YOU"

- 1. "IN THE SIGHT OF ALL ISRAEL,"
- 2. "OF THE ASSEMBLY OF THE LORD,"
- 3. "AND IN THE HEARING OF OUR GOD:"

"BE CAREFUL TO FOLLOW ALL THE COMMANDS OF THE LORD YOUR GOD THAT YOU MAY POSSESS THIS GOOD LAND AND PASS IT ON AS AN INHERITANCE TO YOUR DESCENDANTS FOREVER."

"MY CHARGE TO YOU" AS A NATION IS TO:

BE CAREFUL TO BE OBEDIENT.

THE RESULT will be that

"YOU WILL POSSESS THIS GOOD LAND AND PASS IT ON AS AN INHERITANCE TO YOUR DESCENDANTS FOREVER."

That is THE PURPOSE for your obedience.

v. 9 And you, my son Solomon, acknowledge the God of your father, and serve Him with the wholehearted devotion and with a willing mind, for the Lord searches every heart and understands every motive behind the thoughts. If you seek Him, He will be found by you; but if you forsake Him, He will reject you forever.

At this public occasion, he now turns once again to his son Solomon. He challenges him to

"ACKNOWLEDGE THE GOD OF YOUR FATHER, AND SERVE HIM WITH"

"WHOLEHEARTED DEVOTION"

"AND WITH A WILLING MIND"

This "WHOLEHEARTED DEVOTION" is with an UNDIVIDED DEVOTION.

Matthew 6:24

No one can serve two masters; for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will hold to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and Mammon.

The KEY to EFFECTIVE SERVANTHOOD is to

"SERVE HIM WITH WHOLEHEARTED DEVOTION AND WITH A WILLING MIND."

The REASON for this command is given in the next phrase:

"THE LORD HAS CHOSEN YOU TO BUILD A TEMPLE AS A SANCTUARY."

He says TWO THINGS:

- 1. "BE STRONG" and,
- 2. "DO THE WORK."

Back in <u>verse 13</u> of <u>1 Chronicles 22</u>, he said: "Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid or discouraged."

He said also in verse 16: "Begin the work and the Lord be with you."

<u>v. 11</u> Then David gave his son Solomon the plans for the portico of the temple, its buildings, its storerooms, its upper parts, its inner rooms and the place of atonement.

This is a STRATEGIC part of the ceremony. David now PASSES INTO THE HANDS of his son, Solomon, the

SITE PLANS, the

BLUEPRINTS, the

ARCHITECT DRAWINGS, the

BUILDING PLANS FOR THE TEMPLE.

"THE PLACE OF ATONEMENT" is a reference to the HOLY OF HOLIES.

v. 12 He gave him the plans of all that the Spirit had put in his mind for the courts of the temple of the Lord and all the surrounding rooms, for the treasuries of the temple of God and for the treasuries for the dedicated things.

Just as the Lord had given to Moses on Mt. Sinai the plans for the tabernacle, now, David acknowledges "THAT THE SPIRIT HAD PUT IN HIS MIND" these plans for the temple.

1 Chronicles 28

v. 13 He gave him instructions for the divisions of the priests and Levites and for all the work of serving in the temple of the Lord, as well as for all the articles to be used in its service.

David has COVERED ALL THE BASES. He has MADE THE PROVISIONS for the building, he has PROVIDED THE SKILLED PEOPLE, now he GIVES HIM THE PLANS FOR THE TEMPLE itself, FOLLOWED BY THE PROGRAM of the priesthood as they function in the temple.

The PROVISIONS,

the PEOPLE,

the PLANS,

the PROGRAM,

ARE ALL PREPARED for Solomon to carry out during his reign.

1 Chronicles 28

- v. 14 He designated the weight of gold for all the gold articles to be used in various kinds of service, and the weight of silver for all the silver articles to be used in various kinds of service:
- v. 15 the weight of gold for the gold lampstands and their lamps, with the weight for each lampstand and its lamps; and the weight of silver for each silver lampstand and its lamps, according to the use of each lampstand;
- <u>v.16</u> the weight of gold for each table for consecrated bread; the weight of silver for the silver tables;
- v. 17 the weight of pure gold for the forks, sprinkling bowls and pitchers; the weight of gold for each gold dish; the weight of silver for each silver dish;

<u>v. 18</u> and the weight of the refined gold for the altar of incense. He also gave him the plan for the chariot, that is the cherubim of gold that spread their wings and shelter the ark of the covenant of the Lord.

v. 19 "All this," David said, "I have in writing from the hand of the Lord upon me, and he gave me understanding in all the details of the plan."

Back in <u>verse 12</u>, he acknowledged the fact that the PLANS had been the WORK of the SPIRIT who had put these PLANS in his mind.

And now, he is saying here in verse 19 again that:

"THE HAND OF THE LORD WAS UPON HIM, AND GAVE HIM UNDERSTANDING IN ALL THE DETAILS OF THE PLAN."

In Charles Colson's book, <u>Loving God</u>, he tells the story of an incredible ninety-one-year-old woman, known affectionately as Grandma Howell. If anyone ever lived out the power of written encouragement, it was Myrtle Howell.

As she moved into the twilight of her life, she had more than one reason to let depression take over--to just give up and die. Her youngest son had died. Her oldest son was in declining health. Many of her friends were dying and she had begun to believe she had nothing left to live for. One day she prayed with all of her heart and told the Lord that if He didn't have anything more for her to do, she was ready to die.

According to Grandma Howell, God spoke to her in three words: Write to prisoners. After arguing with the Lord about her lack of education and her age, Myrtle wrote her first letter:

Dear Inmate,

I am a grandmother who loves and cares for you who is in a place you had not plans to be.

My love and sympathy goes out to you. I am willing to be a friend to you in correspondence. If you'd like to hear from me, write me. I will answer every letter you write.

A Christian Friend, Grandmother Howell

When the letter was sent to the Atlanta Penitentiary, the prison chaplain sent Myrtle the names of eight prison inmates. That was the beginning of an unbelievable ministry of encouragement. Over the next months, this elderly woman carried on an extensive written ministry with hundreds of incarcerated men and women-and all of it was done from her little room in a high-rise home for the aged in Columbus, Georgia.

According to Colson, writing to the prisoners was only half of Myrtle's joy. They wrote back! And their letters were warm, rich epistles of gratitude. One inmate who signed her name "Grandmother Janice" wrote:

Dear Grandmother,

I received your letter and it made me sad when you wrote that you think you may not be alive much longer. I thought that I would wait and come to see you and then tell you all you have meant to me. But now I've changed my mind. I'm going to tell you now.

You've given me all the love and concern and care that I've missed for years and my whole outlook on life has changed. You've made me realize that life is worth living and that it's not all bad. You claim it's all God's doing, but I think you deserve the credit.

I didn't think I was capable of feeling love for anyone again, but I know I love you as my very own precious grandmother.

As I read this story, it made a deep impression on my heart. No one is ever too old to perform acts of love. Just think what would happen to the many hurting people of this world if Grandma Howell's example was emulated. And just imaging what would happen to the "Grandma Howell's" of the world. According to Myrtle, "Writing to inmates has filled my last days with joy. . . . These last years have been the most fulfilling of my whole life." pp. 159-61

v. 20 David also said to Solomon his son, "Be strong and courageous, and do the work. Do not be afraid or discouraged, for the Lord God, my God, is with you. He will not fail you or forsake you until all the work for the service of the temple of the Lord is finished."

Back in verse 10, David said, "Be strong and do the work."

Back in <u>verse 13</u> of <u>chapter 22</u>, he said, "Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid or discouraged."

HERE, in essence, he says all of this together

in these FIVE ADMONITIONS:

- 1. "BE STRONG,"
- 2. "BE COURAGEOUS,"
- 3. "DO THE WORK,"
- 4. "DO NOT BE AFRAID,"
- 5. "DO NOT BE DISCOURAGED."

AND THEN he gives the REASON:

"FOR THE LORD GOD, MY GOD, IS WITH YOU."

And then he TELLS WHY he does not have to worry: because his God

"WILL NOT FAIL YOU OR FORSAKE YOU UNTIL THE WORK FOR THE SERVICE OF THE TEMPLE OF THE LORD IS FINISHED."

His PRESENCE IS THERE to guide and sustain you.

The Lord Himself goes before you and will be with you; He will never leave you nor forsake you. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged.

<u>Hebrews 13:5,6</u> (King James Version)

Let your way of life be free from the love of money, being content with what you have; for He Himself has said, "I will never desert you, nor will I ever forsake you," so that we confidently say, "The Lord is my helper, I will not be afraid. What shall man do to me?"

Delitzsch has said:

In conclusion, David encourages his son to go forward to the work with good courage, for his God would not forsake him; and the priests and Levites, cunning workmen, and the princes, together with the whole people, would willingly support him.

Selman calls the last couple of verses:

A public equivalent of the earlier private commissioning of Solomon. The same basic features recur, (a) encouragement (Be strong and courageous, . . . Do not be afraid or discouraged); (b) assurance of God's help (for the Lord God, my God is with you; He will not fail you or forsake you, and (c) instruction to carry out the task (Do the work. . . until all the work for the service of the temple of the Lord is finished). Several of these phrases are closely associated with Moses' hand over to Joshua, showing that God's assistance had not diminished from earlier days.

What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

- LESSON #1: We see a marvelous manifestation of God's grace in the birth of Solomon.
- LESSON #2: David is much involved in taking care of business right up to the hour of his death.
- LESSON #3: It is our responsibility, along with David, to make extensive preparations before our death.
- LESSON #4: What do you have in your heart that you would like to do for the Lord?
- LESSON #5: David's prayer for Solomon is that "the Lord will give him discretion and understanding."
- LESSON #6: David tells his son Solomon to "Be strong and courageous, do not be afraid or discouraged."
- LESSON #7: The Lord has chosen you for some purpose. Have you discovered that, and are you cooperating with that purpose at this time?
- LESSON #8: David challenges Solomon to "Serve the Lord with wholehearted devotion and a willing mind."
- LESSON #9: "The Lord searches every heart and understands every motive behind the thoughts."
- LESSON #10: "If you seek the Lord, He will be found by you."

LESSON #11: "Be strong and courageous and do the work. Do not be afraid or discouraged; for the Lord God, my God is with you, He will not fail you or forsake you."

There is no paschal lamb, or young pigeon, or bitter herb among all the beasts, and birds, and hyssop-plants of which Solomon spoke and sang so much. There is no day of anointment, or so much as one of the many ordained sacrifices for sin, in any of Solomon's real or imputed writings. p. 284

David Brainerd was sustained by this confidence to his death. Seven days before he died he gave expression to the kind of affections this chapter of The Pleasures of God is meant to kindle. These are the last words he had the strength to write with his own hand:

Friday, October 2. My soul was this day, at turns, sweetly set on God: I longed to be "with him" that I might "behold his glory;" I felt sweetly disposed to commit all to him, even my dearest friends, my dearest flock, and my absent brother, and all my concerns for time and eternity. Oh, that his kingdom might come in the world; and they might all love and glorify him for what he is in himself; and that the blessed Redeemer might "see of the travail of his soul, and be satisfied." Oh, "come, Lord Jesus, come quickly! Amen."

"O Jesus, I Have Promised" was written by an English clergyman on such a special day. It was penned especially for a confirmation service in which John Bode's own daughter and two sons were to make their life's vows of commitment to God and His service. He told his three children: "I have written a hymn containing all the important truths I want you to remember when you are fully confirmed."

Without doubt, the three children of John Bode never forgot that confirmation service and their father's concern for them as they sang these words throughout their lives:

O Jesus, I have promised to serve Thee to the end; be Thou forever near me, my Master and my Friend: I shall not fear the battle if Thou art by my side, nor wander from the pathway if Thou wilt be my guide.

O let me feel Thee near me-the world is ever near; I see the sights that dazzle, the tempting sounds I hear: My foes are ever near me, around me and within; but Jesus, draw Thou nearer, and shield my soul from sin.

O Jesus, Thou hast promised to all who follow Thee, that where Thou art in glory, there shall Thy servant be; and, Jesus, I have promised to serve Thee to the end; O give me grace to follow, my Master and my Friend.
