The beauty of the black lacy design against the pastel purple and orange background grabbed my attention. The intricacy of the fragile pattern led me to assume that it had been created by a skilled artist. 

Because of the fear, the prophet is moved to action for the first time in our biography without a word from the Lord.

We have noted at each juncture the prophet has been trained to wait for a message from the Lord to go to the brook Cherith, to go to Zarephath, to go to the palace, and now in fear, it says, "He arose", or he moves to action. He should have learned that he could trust the same Lord who hid him at Cherith or in the house at Zarephath right under the kings nose, that that same God could protect and provide for him now, even if it meant there was an Obadiah who had to hide him in a cave to protect him from Jezebe He was (afraid) and arose and he ran for his life.

When you're most eager to act is the time you'll make the most pitiful mistakes. How often do we look to circumstances rather that to the Lord of the circumstances, and we make a mistake by running out of the will of God, Walking by sight always magnifies the difficulties. We can see this in the experience of the 12 spies who went in to the land; 10 of whom felt that it was impossible to go in because they had their eyes on the difficulties and circumstances that surrounded their taking of the land rather than the God who had made the promise. We see this in the life of Philip and Andrew at a time when they only had 5 loaves and a couple of fish. What are these among so every provision needs the stands before them. every provision necessary to meet the needs that are before them.



Who can measure the impact that could have been made if Elijah had only been willing to remain where he was. The people desperately needed his presence. The tide had turned away from Baal toward God and yet, because of the threat of Jezebel, he leaves in the night with his servant in driving rain, and you would think that he would lay it before the Lord in quiet assurance that the Lord would hide him, even as He had done before. He's utterly demoralized and panic-stricken. Leaving his servant in Beersheba, he goes into the wild desert, plodding on in the burning heat. There are no ravens, no Cherith, and no Zarephath. What might have been if only Elijah had held his ground, dwelling in the secret place place of the most High, and hiding under the shadow of the Almighty. It could have been the very means of reformation in the nation Israel. Perhaps the 7000 secret disciples would have come to the light, and there would have been a major revival.

It is amazing how many of God's great men fail in the area of their strength. For Abraham, his faith, when he went into Egypt, lied; Moses, his meekness, in anger struck the rock; Elijah, his courage turns to fear through the threat of a wicked king.

John the Baptist, who while in prison, sent the depressing message, It was "Art thou He, or look we for another?"

"And he lay down and slept under a juniper tree; and behold, there was an angel touching him, and he said to him, 'Arise, eat.'

There were two very definite needs that Elijah had at this point, and in the

midst of his physical exhaustion, he could not see to discern the directions of the Lord. (First, he needed rest, and secondly) he needed food. The Lord gave him what he needed rather than what he wanted.

Elijah immediately indulges in self-defense by speaking of his past track record, that he's been zealous and that the majority have forsaken the Lord. Then he speaks of his own lonliness, that he is alone, left, and they are seeking his life to take it away.

Verse 11: "So he said, 'Go forth, and stand on the mountain before the Lord.' And behold, the Lord was passing by! And a great and strong wind was rending the mountains and breaking in pieces the rocks before the Lord; but the Lord was not in the wind. And after the wind, an earthquake, but the Lord

was not in the earthquake."

Now the Lord is preparing to reveal Himself to His servant.

Verse 12: "And after the earthquake a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire; and after the fire a sound of a gentle blowing."

Verse 13: "And it came about when Elijah heard it, that he wrapped his face in his mantle, and went out and stood in the entrance of the cave. And behold, a voice came to him and said, 'What are you doing here, Elijah?'"

Here we have again a repetition of the earlier question.

Verse 14: "Then he said, 'I have been very zealous for the Lord, the God of hosts; for the sons of Israel have forsaken Thy covenant, torn down Thine altars and killed Thy prophets with the sword. And I alone am left; and they seek my life, to take it away."

Elijah's response is the same as to the earlier question, defense for his zeal and the fact that he is the only one left, and that there are those who want to take his life.

Verse 15; "And the Lord said to him, 'Go, return on your way to the wilder-ness of Damascus, and when you have arrived, you shall anoint Hazael king over Syria;"

Verse 16: "and Jehu the son of Nimshi you shall anoint king over Israel; and Elisha the son of Shaphat of Abel-meholah you shall anoint as prophet in your place."

The Lord realizes that the solution to his depressed prophet is to reveal Himself to him and then to give him some new assignments. Get on with the task

We have noted together in our biography that the Lord's hand guided him to Jezreel, and now His voice spoke with these new assignments.

Verse 17: "And it shall come about, the one who escapes from the sword of Hazael, Jehu shall put to death, and the one who escapes from the sword of Jehu, Elisha shall put to death."

These are the three leaders who are going to carry out God's judgment upon the people for their departure, probably the assignments that He had in mind for Elijah.

Verse 18: "Yet I will leave 7000 in Israel, all the knees that have not bowed to Baal and every mouth that has not kissed him."

To help Elijah get the true picture, the Lord adds these words in the 18th verse, that there are still 7000 in Israel that are a part of his company, so Elijah does not have to feel alone. — Nucleus For the Revival a in

CONCLUSION

What lessons can we learn from this passage that has been under consideration in the life of Elijah. First we can learn that it's always wrong to make a move on the basis of an emotional threat or circumstances which are contrary. Secondly getting out of God's will by emotions and circumstances is a very painful experience. We have learned the reason Elijah did this is because he had his eyes no longer on God but on a furious woman.

We also learned from this study some of the consequences of missing God's will, physically, emotionally, he's depressed and lonely, spiritually he is looking on circumstances instead of God.

We also learned that God's attitude is not affected by our failure.

We have also learned from this study how easy it is to miss God's will. Elijah did simply by walking by sight which magnifies difficulties and paralyzes spiritual activity. Difficulties are nothing to the soul who is occupied with God. We can see this in the Red Sea account, in the life of David, and with scores of others who are victorious as long as they keep their eyes upon the Lord.

I think there's a tremendous lesson for us in God's attitude toward His servant who is outside of His will. He did not love him any less while tracking him over the hills of Samaria like a shepherd tracking a wandering sheep. There's no upbraiding reproaches, no threats of dismissal. Instead He makes loving provision of sleep, food, and has kind thoughts toward His servant. We see this same thing true in the experience of the prodigal son, and in the life of Jonah. Unconditional love

We also learned that though we are forsaken by man, we are never forgotten by God.

When you think you have missed God's will, get alone with Him and hear afresh His voice.

God explores three questions many Christians ask: Is God hidden? Is God silent? Is God unfair? It struck me that those questions did not trouble the Hebrews in the Sinai wilderness. They saw evidence of God every day, heard Him speak, and lived under a contract signed in His own hand. Out of this relationship emerged a great gift from the Jews to the world: monotheism—the belief in one sovereign, holy God.

Today many treat God like a cosmic good buddy. We could use a refresher course from the Old Testament on God's majesty.

Pastor Gordon MacDonald writes, "The most costly sins I have commit-

ted came at a time when I briefly suspended my reverence for God. . . . I quietly (and insanely) concluded that God didn't care and most likely wouldn't intervene were I to risk the violation of one of His commandments."

MacDonald says his own love for God has moved away from a sentimental model, which never satisfied him, to something closer to a father/son model. He is learning to reverence, obey, and thank God; to express appropriate sorrow for sin; to pursue a quietness in which he might hear God whisper. He seeks a relationship with God appropriate to the profound difference between the two parties.

As God's children, we may "come boldly to the throne of grace" (Heb. 4:16). But let us ever be mindful of our Father's inestimable majesty. —Philip Yancey

Almost everyone will at some time in their life be affected by depression, either their own or someone else's. Some common signs and symptoms of depression include feelings of hopelessness, pessimism, worthlessness, and helplessness. Although we cannot say for certain that characters in the Bible experienced depression, we can say that some did exhibit a deep sense of despondency, discouragement, and sadness that is linked to personal powerlessness and loss of meaning and enthusiasm for life.

Elijah is one biblical character who fits this description. After defeating the prophets of Baal, he received a death threat from Jezebel. His hope was shattered, and despondency set in.

He wanted to die! God helped Elijah deal with his despondency in several ways. The Lord did not rebuke him for his feelings but sent an angel to provide for his physical needs. Then, the Lord revealed Himself and reminded Elijah that He was quietly working among His people. Next, He renewed Elijah's mission by giving him new orders. Finally, God reminded Elijah that he wasn't alone.

In our times of discouragement, let us remember that God loves us and desires to lead us to a place of a renewed vision of Himself! — Marvin Williams

very fact that the disciples stated was right, but the conclusions they drew from those facts were wrong. Anything that has even a hint of dejection spiritually is always wrong. If I am depressed or burdened, I am to blame, not God or anyone else. Dejection stems from one of two sources-I have either satisfied a lust or I have not had it satisfied. In either case, dejection is the result. Lust means "I must have it at once." Spiritual lust causes me to demand an answer from God, instead of seeking God Himself who gives the answer. What have I been hoping or trusting God would do? Is today "the third day" and He has still not done what I expected? Am I therefore justified in being dejected and in blaming God? Whenever we insist that God should give us an answer to prayer we are off track. The purpose of prayer is that we get ahold of God, not of the answer. It is impossible to be well physically and to be dejected, because dejection is a sign of sickness. This is also true spiritually. Dejection spiritually is wrong, and we are always to blame for it.

We look for visions from heaven and for earth-shaking events to see God's power. Even the fact that we are dejected is proof that we do this. Yet we never realize that all the time God is at work in our everyday events and in the people around us. If we will only obey, and do the task that He has placed closest to us, we will see Him. One of the most amazing revelations of God comes to us when we learn that it is in the everyday things of life that

we realize the magnificent deity of Jesus Christ.

in Moses' words, "to humble and to test you so that in the end it might go well with you" (Deut. 8:16, NIV).

Luke tells us that Jesus healed ten lepers who requested it. "Now one of them, when he saw that he had been healed, turned back, glorifying God with a loud voice, and he fell on his face at His feet, giving thanks to Him. And he was a Samaritan. And Jesus answered and said, 'Were there not ten cleansed? But the nine—where are they?'" (Luke 17:15–17).

Gratitude is an attitude! Patriotism is a form of gratitude. I am reminded of what it cost in shed blood for me to live in a free country. If those who died were on parade, the line would circle the globe.

Gratitude is also the oil in the machinery of interpersonal relationships. At our spring couples' conferences this year, I had participants write a tribute after each of the four sessions.

In the first session they wrote a tribute to their mates. In the second session they wrote a tribute to their children. In the third session they wrote a tribute to their parents. In the fourth session they wrote a tribute to God.

That exercise gave those attending a renewed appreciation for one another and for God.

Independence

Another roaming beast we want to fence out is a spirit of independence. If we do not learn dependence upon God, we may end up with a hip out of joint like Jacob. We will be making the rest of the trip leaning on the top of a staff. We can be so stubborn and bull-headed at times. God then must take us through the breaking process.

Scott and Janina Walker are hosts for one of my home Bible

studies. I was touched one evening as Scott shared his testimony: "At age thirty-eight my life was out of control. I was drinking heavily. My marriage and my employment were in jeopardy. Midlife transition was rapidly becoming midlife crisis. I never studied God's Word and seldom prayed. When I did pray, it was mostly the 911 type. I had abdicated my role as the spiritual leader of my family.

"I knew the Lord had been knocking on my heart's door for many years, but I stubbornly refused to respond. Instead, I attended church, occasionally dropped money in the offering plate, contributed to worthy community causes, and patted myself on the back for being a better husband and father than most other guys I knew.

"Outwardly, I was cruising along thinking I was a pretty neat guy because of my achievements. My athletic abilities had paid for my undergraduate and graduate education, and my business skills had landed some great employment opportunities. My wife, son, and daughter were in good health. Any onlooker would think I had it made.

"But inwardly my life had jumped the tracks. My marriage relationship with Janina was deteriorating. Soon I became restless and discontented with my job. Pride and selfishness were pushing me to the breaking point.

"Then six years ago, in my hour of deepest need, another couple invitied Janina and me to attend Don Anderson's Bible study in a nearby home. Janina had already sensed a spiritual void in her life and she really wanted to go. After she kept prodding me, I finally but reluctantly said, "Well, I'll go with you just once."

"At first I thought, Why should I go to a Bible study? I haven't done anything bad—like murder, rape, or robbery. I'm a good guy. Although I agreed to attend just to placate my wife, little did I

know that God was planning a divine appointment with me.

"That night the Lord began showing me I was living in spiritual darkness. Again, I felt Him knocking at my heart's door. Right then with some fear and trepidation, I opened it. Through God's Word I began to see myself as a sinner in need of a Savior. What a difference Jesus Christ began to make in my life! By God's grace I am a new creation.

"My personal encounter with Christ has revolutionized my home and my work. All the energy I once expended in resisting Him is now focused on pursuing Him and His will by the reading of His Word."

Scott's story reminds me of David's words, "The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise" (Ps. 51:17 NIV).
