Focused and Flexible

For this is what the high and lofty One says—he who lives forever, whose name is holy:

"I live in a high and holy place, but also with him who is contrite and lowly in spirit, to revive the spirit of the lowly and to revive the heart of the contrite."

Isaiah 57:15 (NIV)

"Has not my hand made all these things, and so they came into being?" declares the Lord.

Isaiah 66:2 (NIV)

In God's economy, focus must be accompanied by flexibility. It is not an either/or; it is a both/and experience. When you have focus without flexibility, you pursue the pathway to failure.

Most New Year's resolutions last about two weeks. When you miss a day or two, you put the blimp back into the hangar till next year.

Let's look first at focus, then flexibility.

Focus has to do with our passion. Flexibility has to do with the Father's plan.

Our focus should be on the living word, Christ, and the written word, the Bible.

To be focused means to be single minded and determined, organized to achieve a particular goal.

We don't focus on what is; we focus on what will be. In the words of the writer of Hebrews:

Therefore, since we are having so great a cloud of witnesses surrounding us, let us also lay aside every encumbrance, and the sin which so easily entangles us, and let us be running with perseverance the race lying before us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the originator and perfecter of faith, who for the joy lying before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. (Hebrews 12:1 -2 DAV)

Focus means, "This thing I do." Spurgeon warns that the man who does a "half-a-dozen things generally fails in them all....a minister with his heart at all divided will make a failure of his ministry." In the words of martyred theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer, "The essence of Chastity is not the Suppression of lust, but the total orientation of one's life toward a goal." A.W. Tozer says the essence of running life's race well is found in Hebrews 12:2: "From all this we learn that faith is not a once-done act, but a continuous gaze at the heart of the Triune God."

Dr. Howard Hendricks finished his earthly race with dignity and grace. What a hero, mentor, and model for thousands of Dallas Seminary students (yours truly included) he was. According to Professor Hendricks, the foundation of all must be "focus." In his words:


Paul riveted me many years ago with his words, One thing I do...

...I heard Dr. A. W. Tozer say, "What comes into your mind when you think about God is the most important thing about you."

Jesus told Martha that...only one thing is needed. Mary has chosen what is better, and it will not be taken away from her (Luke 10:42). That tells me that I have to make tough choices. So many "goods" and "betters" have to be discarded in favor of the one thing....

If anything has kept me on track all these years, it's been skewered to this principle of central focus. You might remember my inverted triangle; there are many things I can do (and you can especially), but I have to narrow it down to the one thing I must do. The secret of concentration is elimination.



Tom Prothro: Meet the Top CPA in Texas

For Tom and Kim Prothro, longtime friends of Bible Teaching Resources, 2013 has featured the best of times and the worst of times. March 2013 brought the devastating, unexpected home-going of their daughter, Ashley Prothro Trant, who passed away in Lafayette, LA, following a brief illness, leaving behind a husband and four young children. In May, Kim received a masters degree from Dallas Theological Seminary. On July 30, 2013, Texas Governor Rick Perry appointed Tom presiding officer of the Texas State Board of Public Accountancy, by any measure a career highlight.

We know what a credit Tom is to his profession. His CPA firm, Prothro, Wilhelm & Company of Tyler, TX, serve as accountants and auditors for BTR.

We caught up with Tom recently to discuss his new state position and life in general. He graciously gave us his time.



Q: You've been a member of the Texas State Board of Public Accountancy for some years now. Tell us about your involvement and appointment as presiding officer.

Tom: I am finishing my fourth year and starting my fifth. Board members serve six year terms. Somewhere around every two years, we get a new presiding officer. Governor Perry appointed me [presiding officer] a couple of months ago. I was just thrilled that somebody from a small market like East Texas would get the opportunity to do that. It is a real honor that I never anticipated.

I was talking to a fellow—there are five members appointed to the state board every two years—I was talking to one of the fellows in, I guess, my class. He is from Abilene. He was telling me he was glad I was going to assume the leadership. I answered, “All I can tell you is that I will do my very best.” That’s all we can do.

Q: God has evidently put you in this position, and this has not been an easy year for you and your family. Has your faith played a role in your work at the state board?

Tom: God really did put me in this position. Through [our daughter] Ashley’s ordeal, when I was driving from Tyler to Lafayette where she was hospitalized, some of the first people I called were ones who worked for the state board or were on the state board. That’s how much they care for one another and that’s how much the board members care for one another...and how much the staff cares. I was just amazed at how much they reached out to me and cared for me. And they still do. Not a conversation goes by, after we’ve finished with the business, without someone asking, “Tell me how you are really doing. Can I pray for you? Can I help you in any way?” I find that remarkable for a state agency.

We have about 50 employees down there at the state board, and I received a card signed by all of them personally with little messages [after Ashley’s death]. We received flowers from many board members. Several came to the funeral in Tyler. Most of them drove up for the day and

drove back that same day. They turned around and drove back to Austin and other places. They didn’t have to do that. It really touched me that they would put that kind of effort into caring for us.

Q: It sounds like the state board consists of some remarkable people.

Tom: Yes. The executive director Bill Treacy has put together a team that has been together for many, many years. Many are employees of 20 plus years. He has built an organization that you and I would be proud of as taxpayers in Texas because of just how much they care for people and what a professional organization it is.

I find lots of good opportunities to share my faith in different settings and in different ways.

Q: The Texas state board has unusual continuity.

Tom: Yes. That is a lot of continuity. They know their job. There is a national organization called the National Association of State Board of Accountancy, and the Texas board is recognized as one of the absolute leaders in that organization of all state boards of accountancy. The Texas board is well

respected and carries a lot of influence. This is in no small part due to the organization Bill Treacy has built. My hat’s off to Bill Treacy.

Q: What will your job involve as presiding officer?

Tom: [Governor] Rick Perry appoints all 15 members of the board, 5 members every two years for six year terms. He also appoints the presiding officer. One of my first duties was to call a nominations committee to nominate new officers and to set up the committee structure for the coming two years that I would be chairman.

I average a trip every other month to Austin, usually for a couple of days. Now there are also swearing in ceremonies for new CPAs. I have attended every one of those since I have been on the board; those take place in June and December on Saturdays. That’s a really cool time, a really neat time. We also recognize all those who have been CPAs for 50 years and tell little stories about

each of those. The ceremony is well attended. We do a great job of that.

Surveys consistently show that CPAs are among the most well respected professions. We did not always do the swearing in ceremonies. When they started, they were held at the LBJ Library on the University of Texas campus. We've since moved to the Austin civic auditorium and are about to outgrow that. There's always someone in his or her 60s getting a CPA. Why not?

Q: It sounds like you have significant committee work.

Tom: The presiding officer presides over board meetings. These are held on a Thursday morning at 10:00 and last two to three hours. The day before, several committees meet. I am an ad hoc member of all committees, so I keep my pulse on them. All board members serve on committees, usually two or three separate ones. We try to rotate members round to get people with different experiences in place. It used to be that the Thursday board meeting was an all-day affair, but with the enhanced use of the committee structure, the main meeting is shorter and way more efficient. The committee structure was in place before Bill Treacy's appointment as director, but he has made better use of it.

Q: So what exactly does the state board do?

Tom: I'll direct you to the website (www.tsbpa.state.tx.us/) for the whole picture. Basically, we have two enforcement committees [to uphold the standards of the profession], one concerned with technical standards for review of auditing or accounting principles. The other enforcement committee has to do with behavioral infractions: treatment of clients, billing issues. Those two committees are the ones which might recommend we penalize someone, put practice restrictions on somebody, or revoke their license to practice in an extreme case. We have a CPE committee to set standards for continuing education in the profession and to authorize CPE providers in Texas. Our primary purpose is to administer the CPA exam in the state of Texas.

Q: Do you see your involvement on the state board as a ministry?


Tom: I find lots of good opportunities to share my faith in different settings and in different ways. It's just another opportunity that God puts before you to share your faith and to be an example. I am surprised at how many believers there are in the profession and how many there are in the organization.

Q: Is there anything else you'd like to add?

Tom: Well, maybe this...I'd like to give a sincere thank you to Bob Roseman and Walter

Wilhelmi, my partners. We really prayed about my involvement on the state board. You have to apply to get appointed and we prayed about it. They felt it would be something to do that would be a ministry, an outreach, good for our firm. It is a big time commitment I appreciate them being willing to let me serve in that way.

We at BTR would like to give our sincere thanks to Tom Prothro for serving his state and his savior in such a significant way. Our best goes to Tom and Kim and family in a tough year full of challenge and opportunity. In fact, after this interview was conducted, Tom suffered a stroke from which he



has made a remarkable recovery. Our prayers continue to be with one of the good guys, Tom Prothro.

The Wonderful Resources of Technology God Has Provided

Taking over some of the responsibilities from a seasoned and valued team member like Genevieve Martin has been a little intimidating at times, but also exciting (at least that is what I tell myself when I feel somewhat overwhelmed!). BTR has tapped into some wonderful opportunities with resources like OnePlace.com, the BTR website, and MPR Philippines Radio broadcasts. As a new team member, I wanted to learn more about these venues to successfully support them. I started by introducing myself to our contacts who graciously tutored me on exactly what we were doing and how we were using these mediums. During these introductions, our contacts made me aware of new tools and services we could implement and utilize. Don asked me to share with our BTR family the steps we are taking to make the best use of promoting BTR materials with these wonderful resources.

The BTR website:

James and Shelly Bowman are our web designers at Design by Geeks. In April, they began working on the website with several objectives: (1) create a new Wordpress platform to allow the website to be presentable and function well on multiple devices, (2) redesign the webstore to improve functionality and upgrade the security for transactions, (3) solve our FTP issues, and (4) make the website user-friendly for BTR staff to implement new resources or edits to keep the site current.

Currently, Design by Geeks has created a test site with the new platform and functionality. We have reviewed the test site features and provided feedback to James and Shelly for implementing the real changes to the website. They are working to fulfill our objectives and we look forward to completion of this project in the next few months.

OnePlace.com:

If you have not visited the *Persevering and Pressing On* link on the OnePlace.com page lately, you are in for a treat. We are back on schedule uploading weekly broadcasts of Don's Bible studies, and we have added some additional features. Our new contact, Dustin, has been eager to help us utilize new tools available for OnePlace ministries.

After general updates were made and some download issues corrected, Dustin added our most recent *Grapevine* issues for download, created a link to our daily devotional on

the BTR website, and added a “Devotional” section to our menu that includes all of our *A Great While Before Day* volumes for PDF download. In the next few weeks, OnePlace.com will roll out a “branded player” for our website. Basically, it provides a gateway to the broadcasts on OnePlace.com, but allows functionality without folks having to go directly to the OnePlace.com site.

Philippines MPR (Mindnao Praise Radio) Broadcast:

James and Shelly are working with us to find a more user-friendly FTP solution for uploading and downloading broadcast files of Don’s Bible study series with the MPR folks. Currently, we are testing a free software that will allow us to share folders instead of using our FTP site. We look forward to providing new broadcasts when we have confirmed a new solution that works well for MPR. Currently, MPR is playing past broadcasts until the file transfer issue is resolved.

Coming soon: BTR Facebook page:

This is a new technological tool we look forward to rolling out when the website changes are completed. The BTR Facebook page will direct folks to the BTR website, our OnePlace.com page, and Don’s books on Logos.com. For anyone not familiar with Facebook, it allows access to folks around the world through friends. When any of our BTR family “likes” our Facebook page, they will begin to receive posts from BTR on their personal Facebook page. Any friends viewing their page will see our posts. This gives us the opportunity to reach friends of friends who might not discover BTR otherwise.

On the BTR Facebook page itself, we plan to post daily scriptures and quotes with a link to the daily devotional page on the BTR website. We will include the weekly e-mail. We will also post any events and provide informational links whenever new

issues of the *Grapevine* and volumes of *A Great While Before Day* are published. Additionally, the page will have links to OnePlace.com, Logos.com, and the BTR website. When the website updates are completed and we invite you to our Facebook page, we hope you will visit and “like” us.

While technology can be overwhelming at times, it is also a wonderful resource to reach a greater audience than we ever could have dreamed possible through the expansion of the internet, cell phones, and computers in the past several years. The increase in access and variety of devices now allow us to communicate easily with folks across the world as well as those folks right in our own backyard. Just last month, Don received an e-mail from a South African missionary who stumbled upon the BTR website and has been using Don’s Bible study guides to teach there. We hope to share more stories like this one in the future as we use technology to further BTR’s mission of providing tools for the body of Christ to teach God’s word.



Gray Matter

by David I. Levy, MD, Tyndale House, 2011.

Pearl was so affected by this book, she ordered several copies and sent them as Christmas presents last year. Dr. David Levy practices neurosurgery in San Diego, California.

He is so transparent in telling what a difference it made when he decided to pray with his patients. This is what he says on page 46:

From that day forward, I have offered to pray for nearly every patient before surgery. It has clearly blessed many people as they dealt with illness and loss of control. I began to actually enjoy surgery more than I had previously. Trying to control outcomes and, therefore, what people thought of me had taken the joy from my practice of medicine and from my life. Throughout my training, I had used performance, perfectionism and fear of failure to hone my technical skills.

Now let's consider flexibility. Flexibility is the key to consistency.

The need to flex is seen in Isaiah 55:8-9: "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways," declares the Lord. "As the heavens are higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts" (NIV).

In 1 Corinthians 16:6-7, Paul writes, "and perhaps I shall stay with you, or even spend the winter, that you may send me on my way wherever I may go. For I do not wish to see you now just in passing; for I hope to remain with you for some time, if the Lord permits" (NASB).

By nature we are headstrong and unyielding. Yet flex has to do with the Father's plan.

Proverbs 3: 5-6: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make your paths straight" (NIV).

1 Thessalonians 4:1: "To sum up, my brothers, we beg and pray you by the Lord Jesus, that you continue to learn more and more of the life that pleases God, the sort of life we told you about before" (Phillips).

Ephesians 5:15—17: "Live life, then, with a due sense of responsibility, not as men who do not know the meaning and purpose of life but as those who do. Make the best use of your time, despite all the difficulties of these days. Don't be vague but firmly grasp what you know to be the will of God" (Phillips).

The cowboy knows that the round pen will ultimately produce brokenness. Brokenness is the key to flexibility.

When we manifest flexibility, three things are true:

We have surrendered to God's sovereignty
We are studying His word. 2 Timothy 2:15:
Make every effort to present yourself to
God, approved, as a workman who does not
need to be ashamed, guiding the word of truth
along a straight path" (DAV).

We are seeking His instruction daily. Psalm
25:4-5: "Show me your ways, O Lord, teach me
your paths; guide me in your truth and teach me,
for you are God my Savior, and my hope is in you
all day long" (NIV).

Here are some scriptures to encourage us in
flexibility:

1 Timothy 1:15: "Reliable is the word, and
worthy of wholehearted acceptance, that Christ
Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of
whom I AM FOREMOST" (DAV).

1 Corinthians 2:2: "For I DETERMINED to
know nothing among you except Jesus Christ,
and that One having been crucified" (DAV).

Philippians 3:7: "But whatever things were
gain to me, these things I have considered as loss
for the sake of Christ" (DAV).

1 Corinthians 9:27: "But I am treating my
body roughly and making it serve me, lest when
I have preached to others, I myself should be dis-
qualified" (DAV).

Psalm 92:12-14: "The righteous will flourish
like a palm tree, they will grow like a cedar of
Lebanon; planted in the house of the Lord, they
will flourish in the courts of our God. They will
still bear fruit in old age, they will stay fresh and
green" (NIV).

I had been convicted about the lack of in-
volvement in one-on-one discipleship in my life
when my good friend and BTR board member,
Don Saddoris, wrote the following words of ex-
hortation:

Don,

Let me start by saying that I do understand
what you were saying about discipling this
past Monday. However, I also would like you
to know that in all respects, I consider that you
