
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Monday Morning Emails


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Down and Not Out: WE ARE STILL HERE

"For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways," declares the Lord. "As the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts." Isaiah 55:8-9 (NIV)

Many summers we spent in Colorado doing family camps at Trailwest Lodge, a camp owned by Young Life. I had always wanted to do a little mountain climbing, and we were able to do that because Trailwest Lodge is located close to Mount Princeton, a 14,197 ft. peak. One of the things you learn in mountain climbing that really kind of fakes you out emotionally is thinking you are coming to the last peak and discovering instead that there are all kinds of false peaks before you finally arrive at the higher ground. I think that is true in our Christian lives right now. We feel as if we are getting close to the goal, so we need to make plans. Oswald Chambers said it best: *"Beware of refusing to go to the funeral of your own independence."*

Let's meditate a little bit with our time together on 2 Corinthians 4:7-9, which says, *"This priceless treasure we hold, so to speak, in a common earthenware jar—to*

show that the splendid power of it belongs to God and not to us. We are handicapped on all sides, but we are never frustrated; we are puzzled, but never in despair. We are persecuted, but we never have to stand it alone: we may be knocked down but we are never knocked out!" (Phillips)

I found a wonderful little piece J. Vernon McKee wrote at a major transition in his life. He shared, *"I hope you won't mind my speaking out of personal experience. But the happiest time of my ministry began when I retired from the pastorate. The most spiritually profitable time of my life began at that moment. 


AN ONLINE TYLER STUDY

Mister “Make It Happen”

A TRIBUTE TO ROBERT WHITE

Pearl and I formed Don Anderson Ministries on December 19, 1972. I started traveling and teaching the Word wherever there was an opportunity in 1973. Early on, I started traveling to Austin to teach businessmen's classes at noon, university classes in the afternoon, and then an evening study for couples. During this time I met Robert White and his family. Robert personally took care of my total itinerary during the years that I included Austin on the teaching tour. That meant he provided hospitality for the evening—often making arrangements for one of the classes and then providing overnight accommodations. It was wonderful to have your own personal pilot to take you to places you could only dream about.

Robert had the gift to be able to look at a situation or problem and immediately see the structure and the solution. He also had the gift of generosity with his resources, which he often provided anonymously. Robert invested his time and effort in others within and outside the family, showing his unconditional love for them. He was that rare friend who could be counted on without reservation.


His obituary records that Robert became a Christian at the age of twenty-

nine, after attending Walk Thru the Bible. From that day on nothing mattered more to him than bringing others to know the Lord Jesus. He formed, led, and assisted with numerous Bible studies, gatherings, and other ministries in Austin and elsewhere throughout the remainder of his life. If my calculations are right, he became a Christian in 1976, shortly after Pearl and I began our ministry in 1972. He was a brand new Christian, and I had a passion for teaching the Word of God.

His favorite Bible topic was to teach Spiritual gifts. He had a strong desire to show how a personal relationship with Christ could change people's lives, and he shared a practical approach to helping them understand what it would mean to them in eternity to come.

A Pilot and Friend

As a UT student in 1965, Robert learned to fly. In 1979 Robert and two friends decided to form an aviation company at Mueller Airport and called it Austin Jet. Many are the memories at Austin Jet. We had a Bible class at noon right in the hanger. After the class, Robert would jump in the helicopter and tell us to come along, and we would fly over the University of Texas campus to a Mexican restaurant to

have lunch. On another occasion he took us to Tommy Maxwell's parents' home for lunch, and what a delightful time of fellowship that was.


Robert was a natural pilot and had unusual ability—not only as a pilot, but also as an instructor and a mentor of other pilots. I remember one experience with his oldest son, Taylor, who was the youngest guy to get a license with a jet aircraft. Robert knew that I was going to

be handling the Sunday services at Grace Covenant, and then I would need to be in Amarillo by 5:30 that afternoon. So after a nice lunch, he said Taylor was going to fly us to Amarillo. Of course Robert was accompanying him, and halfway through the flight Robert got up and went to the front. I asked him later what he was doing. He said Taylor was just trying to see how fast it would go!

Through the years, Robert provided aircraft when schedules seemed impossible. I was on a teaching tour when someone died at Hideaway. The funeral was scheduled for the next afternoon. Robert volunteered after the class in Austin to fly us to Hideaway Lake in Tyler to do the funeral, then flew us to Tulsa for the evening study, and then back to Texas. I watched as Robert planned carefully around the thundershowers in the route from Tulsa to Austin. But we made it about two o'clock in the morning and resumed our regular schedule. This is the kind of guy who would never let anything stand in the way of trying to accomplish a task.

One of the special memories that I have is of Robert constantly volunteering to fly us to Colorado to look at properties for a Christian conference grounds. We traveled

many, many places and it was interesting; he never made any indication that he couldn't take care of the expenses for such a trip. When we got to Vale to refuel, one of our Tyler lawyers volunteered to put it on his credit card. Little did he know until later that it was a \$500 ticket!

Willing to Serve

My wife Pearl wrote a tremendous article on Robert's willingness to do anything to make it happen. He had a servant's heart, and we've reprinted Pearl's article in this edition of the *Grapevine* in tribute to him. Later on in our relationship Robert and his family moved to Lakeway, and so it became normal protocol to have a Bible study at their new home there. Those were precious memories as well.

These are a few verses that remind me of Robert:

Mark 10:45 “For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many.”

Luke 9:23 “And He was saying to them all, ‘If anyone wishes to come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow Me.’”

John 13:3-5 “Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into His hands, and that He had come forth from God, and was going back to God, rose from supper, and laid aside His garments; and taking a towel, He girded Himself about. Then He poured water into the basin, and began to wash the disciples' feet, and to wipe them with the towel with which He was girded.”

Joe Aldrich in his book *Secrets of Inner Beauty* says, “Humpty Dumpty was



pushed and the king's men couldn't put him back together again.” Sin has broken all of us, and we can't put ourselves back together; but God can. He does beautiful work and desires that we yield ourselves wholeheartedly to Him as candidates for beauty. We are already sons; He wants us also to serve. Servants are beautiful; check your wardrobe. The ones who will hear, “*Well done, thy good and faithful servant*” will be wearing towels that are worn, faded, and patched because of heavy use. Matthew 20:26, 27 reminds us, “*It is not so among you, but whoever wishes to become great among you shall be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you shall be your slave.*”

Treasured Memories

John Ortberg has written a wonderful book called *Soul Keeping*. The 10 discipleship couples that we are working with have been asked to read the book, and it is most helpful. He says in the flyleaf: “*Jesus calls us to a deep life, one that goes beyond our everyday interests and desires. A rested, well-cared-for soul has the capacity*

to empathize and understand profoundly, to ask questions and not simply go through the motions of faith. It holds our connection to eternity and can help us see past the petty concerns of the present. It has access to the kind of peace, gratitude, freedom, and blessing that comes only from a heavenly well-spring.”

Pearl and I were invited with Alex and Ellen Moore in Chicago to read the *Valley of Vision*, one prayer at a time. We have been doing that since December 1, and it is rich. We also incorporated a hymn that we sing with them. Focus on these words from several of the prayers:

“Thou has struck a heavy blow at my pride, at the false god of self, and I lie in pieces before Thee.”

“O changeless God, under the conviction of thy Spirit I learn that the more I do, the worse that I am, the more I know, the less I know, the more holiness I have, the more sinful I am, the more I love, the more there is to love. O wretched man that I am!”

“Of all hypocrites grant that I may not be an evangelical hypocrite, who sins more safely because grace abounds.”


“O my crucified but never wholly mortified sinfulness! O my life-long damage and daily shame! O my indwelling and besetting sins! O the tormenting slavery of a sinful heart...there is no treasure so wonderful as that continuous experience of thy grace toward me which alone can subdue the risings of sin within: Give me more of it.”

I love this final statement in another prayer: “And let me not lay my pipe too short of the fountain, never touching the eternal spring, never drawing down water from above.”

There are many wonderful people who have come into our lives over these 43 years of traveling and teaching—and not just Robert and his precious family. We send our love to his son Taylor and daughter-in-law Kathy White, daughter and son-in-law Dorie and Leo DeGeest, son and daughter-in-law Jon and Libby White, and daughter and son-in-law Claire and Dan Haines.

SERVANT'S HEART

I frequently accompany Don when he travels to various cities to teach Bible studies. When we are on a teaching tour, a small army serves us. Because they love Jesus, their servant attitudes allow these precious ones to do whatever is necessary to make a class successful.

The wife of a busy executive told me that he was the one who cleaned the bathroom we used while staying in their home.* I was amazed that he would do that to serve us.

If it is hard to accept that an important business executive would clean a bathroom for us, then how much more difficult is it, by faith, to accept that the Son of God washed feet, served tables, healed the sick, and finally gave His life for us? He made the ultimate sacrifice—death on a cross—that we might be saved from our sins!

In light of this, how could we ever think we could please God except by emulating the servant attitude of His Son?

Jesus spoke severely to the Pharisees because of their haughty spirits. Either a servant attitude or a haughty spirit will show itself when we are treated with disrespect or disdain by others. When our servant attitude is tested, we are sometimes dismayed at how quickly we revert to our old arrogant reactions.



Pick up your towel; there are dirty feet all around you!




Where I Am; Heaven, Eternity, and Our Life Beyond by Billy Graham

I previously reviewed *Nearing Home*, and this second book is another great encouragement to all who are nearing the finish line. In *Where I Am*, Rev. Graham shares what the Bible says about eternity in all 66 books—messages of truth, warning, love, and the certainty of the future—all gleaned by a man who would like to be remembered solely as a preacher of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. In it, he quotes a mutual, longtime friend of ours, the late Zig Ziglar who wrote, “*The good news is there is nothing we can do that is bad enough to keep us out of Heaven; the bad news is there is nothing we can do good enough to get us into Heaven.*”



The Third Target & The First Hostage by Joel C. Rosenberg

The Third Target is the first in a new trilogy—a cliff-hanger, stay-up-and-study kind of book that is structured with short chapters to allow you to read one in minutes. With an almost prophetic sense, the author sets the book in the kingdom of Jordan and brings ISIS into



the picture. It is an amazing story that continues into the second book that we also review here. To give you an idea of

what happens, read this excerpt from the final page of the first book:

Finally I heard my editor's voice on the line. “J.B., is that you? What on earth is going on over there?”

“What's going on is all hell is breaking loose. Prime Minister Lavi and President Mansour are injured and en route to hospitals via helicopter. The king is furious but resolute and is swearing vengeance against ISIS. But never mind that. Take this down and get it out on the wire, on Twitter, everywhere. The lead is—“

“What?” he asked frantically. “Say again. I can hardly hear you.”

“I said, take this down. The president of the United States...is missing.”

I was so hooked on the rest of the story that in December when *The First Hostage* came out, I was at the front of the line to get a copy and finished it by New Year's. Both books have tremendous research behind them, and the story is so validated even in the future days after publication. You would really enjoy any of Rosenberg's books, and we have outlined all of them in the *Grapevine*. This most recent one, *The First Hostage*, seems to me the best of all. Kathy Lee Gifford from the NBC Today Show says of Rosenberg, “*He's amazing. He writes the greatest thrillers with so much knowledge of that part of the world.*” I would say “amen” to that about this page-turner. Get ready for 72 chapters of excitement and adventure like you've never experienced on the printed page. 

life down to the one thing I want to do, teach the Bible. That is all I am doing. My life has been whittled down to that, and I am enthusiastic about it. I believe that this is what God wants me to do.” One other writer said, “If you aren’t dead, you aren’t done.” That charged us up greatly about completing the final laps of our lives. As an old man at ninety-four once said, “I cannot but run with all my might because I am close to the goal.”

The Bible tells us in 2 Corinthians 4:7, “*But we are having this treasure in earthenware vessels, in order that the extraordinary (quality of the) power may be of God and not from ourselves.*” (DAV) Paul in verse 1 of that same chapter says: “*Therefore since we are having this ministry*” and now in verse 7 adds, “*we are having this treasure.*” The treasure, of course, is the Christ in verse 6, and the earthenware vessels refer to our bodies. We are having this treasure in earthenware vessels. One translation says we are having this treasure in cracked pots. It is in broken clay jars that the light begins to shine out.

Warren Wiersby in *Be Encouraged* writes: “*The important thing about a vessel is that it be clean, empty, and available for service. Each of us must seek to become ‘a vessel unto honor, sanctified (set apart), and meet for the master’s use, and prepared unto every good work’ (2 Timothy 2:21). We are vessels so that God might use us. We are earthen vessels so that we might depend on God’s power and not our own.*”

I also like what Ray Stedman writes about this topic in *Expository Studies in 2*

Corinthians: Power Out of Weakness: “A pot, or a vessel, is made to hold something. Basic to our humanity is that we are not designed to operate on our own. We were made to hold someone, and that someone is God himself. The glory of humanity is that somehow God designed us to correspond to his deity; and his marvelous deity, with its fullness and wisdom and power, somehow relates to and corresponds to and manifests itself through our humanity.”

The Power of God in Weakness

We see the purpose of having this treasure in earthenware vessels in the last phrase of 2 Corinthians 4:7—“**IN ORDER THAT THE EXTRAORDINARY (QUALITY OF THE) POWER MAY BE OF GOD AND NOT FROM OURSELVES.**” Betty Elliot says it so well: “*We resist sentimentality. We know that it distorts our vision, weakens our purpose... Time changes things we do not want changed. Death puts an end to our love, decays our dreams. We almost lift our hands in an involuntary gesture to stop them, hold them back. But we drop them again, knowing our impotence.*”

Second Corinthians 12:9 puts weakness in a new perspective. Paul writes, “*And He has said to me, ‘My grace is sufficient for you, for power is perfected in weakness.’ Most gladly, therefore, I will rather boast about my weaknesses, that the power of Christ may dwell in me.*” We also read in Isaiah 50:7, “*Because the Sovereign Lord helps me, I will not be disgraced. Therefore*

have I set my face like flint, and I know I will not be put to shame.”

Paul continues in 2 Corinthians, “*We are being hard pressed in every way, but we are not being crushed; perplexed but not despairing;*” In verses 8 and 9 we have four negatives and positives in these two verses. There are eight PRESENT PASSIVE PARTICIPLES that are used here to describe some of Paul’s daily experiences. Paul is telling us in these two verses that this is how it is. We are beholding Him and He is molding us. Each of the participles is in the present tense, so this is a daily portion for the Apostle Paul.

When Circumstances Are Difficult

In conclusion, let’s look at the eight words Paul chooses to describe his circumstances.

1. “WE ARE BEING HARD PRESSED IN EVERY WAY...”

The first Greek word is TIBIA. It means “to press,” “to squash,” “to rub,” or “to hem in.” It describes being distressed by suffering and someone’s scheming. It means to be pressed by pressure. I think of the title of the old country song: “*You Stomped On My Heart and Mashed That Sucker Flat.*”

2. THE SECOND WORD IS STENOCHOREO

“*BUT WE ARE NOT BEING CRUSHED...*” The word can also mean “to crowd,” or “to cramp,” or “to confine.” We’re catching it from every direction, but it isn’t cramping our style.

3. THE THIRD WORD IS APOREO. We have translated it: PERPLEXED

It can mean “to be at a loss,” “uncertain,” or “in doubt.” There are many things in life that cause us to be perplexed, that cause us to be at a loss as to why it happened, or to be uncertain about the goodness of the circumstances—all because we can only see in a mirror dimly. It is also possible to doubt that a good outcome can come from what has taken place. Sometimes we are at a loss for why it was part of the curriculum.

4. THE FOURTH WORD IS EXAPOREO.

This word is just an intensification of the previous word. It means “to be in great difficulty” and “in doubt or despair.”

Verse 9 continues the description of Paul’s circumstances: “*...persecuted but not forsaken; struck down but not destroyed*”

5. THE FIFTH WORD IS THE GREEK WORD DIOKO: persecuted

It means “to persecute,” “to press,” or “to run after and pursue.”

6. THE SIXTH WORD IS EGKATALEIPO: but not forsaken

The word means “abandon,” “forsake,” or “leave behind or desert.” Christ cried from the cross in Matthew 27:46, “*And about the ninth hour Jesus cried out with a loud voice, saying, ‘Eli, Eli lama sabachthani?’ that is, ‘My God, My God, why hast Thou forsaken Me?’*” Paul tells Timothy in 2 Timothy 4:10, “*...for Demas, having loved this present world, has deserted*

me and gone to Thessalonica;"

7. THE SEVENTH WORD IS KATABALLO: struck down

This word means "to throw down" or "to knock down."

I am reminded of another country song: "You knocked me down and I'll be a little bit slow coming back this time..."

8. THE EIGHTH WORD IS THE WORD APOLLUMI: but not destroyed

This word means "to destroy" or "to ruin."

It is the word used "to perish" in several of the gospel verses like John 3:16: "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life."

Phillips translates it: "We may be knocked down but we are never knocked out."

Ingredients:


8 oz	sharp cheddar cold pack cheese
8 oz	Philadelphia™ cream cheese
2 Tbsp	margarine
1 tsp	Worcestershire sauce

2 tsp	pimento, chopped
2 tsp.	green pepper, chopped
