

2 Corinthians 9:15

In *The Purpose of Christmas*, Rick Warren writes, "So God came to earth as Jesus essentially to say 'you guys got it all wrong.' Of course, doing good things matters, but it doesn't make Me love you any more or less. My love for you is unlimited, unconditional, unchanging, and undeserved. So, let me teach you a new concept called grace. You can't purchase it, work for it, or be good enough to merit it. It is a gift that will cost me a lot but it is free to you. Everything I do for you, to you, in you, and through you; every single blessing you have in life is a gift of my grace. I've done it all for you" (69).

For our Christmas meditation this year, I have chosen two verses from Galatians 4.

Galatians 4:4: "But when the fullness of the time came, God sent forth his Son, born of a woman, born under the law."

God acted in the fullness of the time and sent forth His Son.

Wuest writes, "The meaning is that when that moment came which completed the period of time designated by God that should elapse before the coming of the Son of God in incarnation, then He would send forth His Son."

Genesis 15 records God's covenant

with Abram. The Lord makes a statement in Genesis 15:16 that has always helped me understand the concept of the "fullness of time": "In the fourth generation your descendants will come back here, for the sin of the Amorites has not yet reached its full measure."

In Genesis 6:5-6, concerning the period just prior to the flood, we read, "The Lord saw how great man's wickedness on the earth had become, and that every inclination of the thoughts of his heart was only evil all the time. The Lord was grieved that he had made man on the earth, and his heart was filled with pain."

Other verses of scripture expand upon notions of the fullness of time.

Ephesians 1:10: "with a view to an administration suitable to the fulness of the times, that is, the summing up of all things in Christ, things in the heavens and things upon the earth" (NASB).

John 13:1: "Now before the Feast of the Passover, Jesus knowing that His hour had come that He should depart out of this world to the Father, having loved His own who were in the world, He loved them to the end" (NASB).



Investing in the Lives of Others: A New BTF

Pearl and I have become burdened about discipleship as we prepare for the final laps. Two reasons why we are concerned are as follows.


1. We have read Joel Rosenberg's book *The Invested Life*. What a treasure it is!
2. As I turned 80, I realized that I have been neglecting, in ministry, one of the Lord's number one priorities: the making of disciples.

The Lord's final words on His way to the Garden of Gethsemane are recorded in John 15:

"You did not choose Me, but I chose you, and appointed you, that you should go and bear fruit, and that your fruit should remain, that whatever you ask of the Father in My name, He may give to you" (John 15:16 NASB). "By this is My Father glorified, that you bear much fruit, and so prove to be My disciples" (John 15:8 NASB).

Remember those culminating and commissioning words that the resurrected Lord spoke to His disciples in Matthew 28:18-20? "And Jesus came up and spoke to them, saying, 'All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth. Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age'" (NASB).

Early one morning while I was having my devotional time, my reading was in Matthew 21:17-20: "And He left them and went out of the city to Bethany, and lodged there. Now in the morning, when He returned to the city, He became hungry. And seeing a lone fig tree by the road, He came to it, and found nothing on it except leaves only; and He said


to it, 'No longer shall there ever be any fruit from you.' And at once the fig tree withered. And seeing this, the disciples marveled, saying, 'How did the fig tree wither at once?'" (NASB).

As I started to meditate upon these verses, the Lord spoke to me about how many couples and people I had or had not truly discipled. I began evaluating my own circumstances and realized that the "fruitless fig tree" would be a picture of me if I didn't get involved some way in discipling others.

The fact that I had passed my 80th birthday didn't help matters at all because it was so late in the game for me.

This is the reason Pearl and I have chosen five couples, not only to disciple but also to invest our lives in. And you are going to meet each of them, as Jane Rodgers interviews them for subsequent *Grapevines*, so you can understand what

Pearl and I are doing to invest our lives in the lives of others. The five are Scott and Jeannie Borgmann and Brian and Denise Mahoney of Bremerton, Washington; Doug and Kynell Brown of Granbury, Texas; Kervin and Ginear Campbell of Fort Worth, Texas; and Jake and Jeni Billingsley of Buckeye, Arizona.



1 Peter 5:6: "Humble yourselves, therefore, under the mighty hand of God, that He may exalt you at the proper time" (NASB).

Two phrases conclude Galatians 4:4, describing Jesus thus:

1. "born of a woman"
2. "born under the law"

The first phrase, "born of a woman," refers to the virgin birth of Jesus Christ. In the words of John 1:14: "And the Word became flesh and tabernacled among us." Jesus is fully human and fully divine.

Luke 1:34-35: "And Mary said to the angel, 'How can this be, since I am a virgin?' And the angel answered and said to her, 'The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you; and for that reason the holy offspring shall be called the Son of God'" (NASB).

The second phrase, "born under the law," is significant in that it reveals that Jesus was born in bondage, so that he might release us from the bondage of the law. He was born a Jew of the tribe of Judah, circumcised the eighth day; yes, indeed, He was born under the law that He might faithfully fulfill the requirements of the law and then die for our broken law.

MacArthur writes, "In God's timetable, when the exact religious, cultural, and political conditions demanded by His perfect plan were in place, Jesus came into the world. God sent forth His Son. As a father set the time for the ceremony of his son becoming of age and being released from the guardians, stewards, and tutors, so God sent His Son at the precise moment to bring all who believe out from under bondage to the law—a truth Jesus repeatedly affirmed."

Wiersbe says, "Christ's birth at

Bethlehem was not an accident; it was an appointment: Jesus came in 'the fullness of the time.' (And it is worth noting He will come again when the time is ready.)"

As you know I love cowboy poetry. Joe Kreger from Tonkawa, Oklahoma, has written a piece that applies to this situation. It is called "His Time," and Joe has graciously allowed us to reprint it here.

His Time

We have read and we have heard,
the truths revealed in God's own Word.
And from His Word this truth will ring,
there is a time for everything.

And though we're ignorant of the reason
each thing occurs in its own season.
And though we seek to wield the rod,
our times are subject unto God.

Our lives unfold within His plan,
He reigns sovereign over man.
He sets the day for each one's birth,
and guides our journey from this earth.

He has a time for us to cry,
a time to know or wonder why.
A time to strive and build and gain,
a time to leave or to remain.

There's a time to endeavor gaining ground,
and a time to lay our burdens down.

A time to struggle in the fight,
a time to travel to the light.

And now we see our prayer must be,
to live our lives expectantly.
Accepting life without regret,
within the times our God has set.

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God sent forth His Son in the “fullness of time” with two purposes in mind, one involving Him and one involving us. Galatians 4:5: “in order that he might deliver out by the payment of a ransom those under law, in order that we might receive the adoption.”

Purpose 1 is that “He might deliver out by the payment of a ransom those under law.” Now we understand why it was necessary for Him to be “born under law.”

For us to put ourselves under the law again would be to nullify His purpose in coming.

Galatians 3:13: “Christ delivered us by the payment of a ransom from the curse of the law. Having become a curse on behalf of us because it is written cursed is everyone who is suspended upon a tree” (DAV).

Purpose 2 is that “we might receive the adoption.” We fail to cooperate with the Father’s plan when we stay under the law after we have been redeemed.

Ephesians 1:5: “He predestined us to adoption as sons through Jesus Christ to Himself, according to the kind intention of His will” (NASB),

Romans 8:15: “For you have not received a spirit of slavery leading to fear again, but you have received a spirit of adoption as sons by which we cry out, ‘Abba! Father!’” (NASB).

One becomes a son by adoption. In biblical times, adoption did not mean taking one who was not in the family and adding him to the family, as we do today. Adoption formally gave rights and privileges to one who was already a son.

The child had no rights in the family until he was officially constituted a son, and adopted.

When we come to know Christ

as Savior, we become children by birth, and we also become sons in that we enter into all the rights and privileges of sonship.

God sent forth His Son in order that He might deliver, by the payment of a ransom, those under the law. And God sent forth his Son in order that we might receive adoption into His family.

In this twofold purpose, we see God paying the price in order that we might receive this free gift of adoption as a result of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

Anders writes: “Christ came for two purposes: First, he came to redeem those under law. Christ paid the price of his death to free us from the slavery of the law. Second, Christ came that we might receive the full rights of sons. These rights come as a gift, or they don’t come at all. Human effort can never secure them.”

Romans 8:14-17: “For all who are being led by the Spirit of God, these are sons of God. For you have not received a spirit of slavery leading to fear again, but you have received a spirit of adoption as sons by which we cry out, ‘Abba! Father!’ The Spirit Himself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, heirs also, heirs of God and fellow heirs with Christ, if indeed we suffer with Him in order that we may also be glorified with Him” (NASB).

Max Lucado writes, “Father, what a privilege to be your child through faith in Christ. Help me to remember today that I



The Path of Life

Don and I were traveling west toward Fort Worth in the early morning. There were low dark clouds in the sky above us. We knew we would soon be in the rain. But he who practices the truth comes to the light, that his deeds may be manifested as having been wrought in God" (John 3:19-21 NASB).

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BOOKSHELF

Beautiful Outlaw by John Eldredge
This is a refreshing review of the life of Christ from a slightly different perspective. It will be an enjoyable read for you. I love what Eldredge says on page 208 as he quotes Oswald Chambers: "Our only task... is to maintain a vital connection with Jesus Christ, seeing that nothing interferes with it."

God Loves You, He Always Has, He Always Will by David Jeremiah
Pearl and I had the privilege of being with Dr. David Jeremiah in Oklahoma City in April and hearing numerous messages in reference to this book. I would suggest that you use this work for those people who have not come to know Jesus Christ as Savior. It is a book of rejoicing and affirmation for the believer, but it would provide a wonderful testimony to those who do not know Christ. Jeremiah quotes the great Puritan preacher Richard Baxter on page 230:

*My Knowledge of that Life is small;
The Eye of Faith is dim;
But it's enough that Christ knows all;
And I shall be with him.*

Service by Marcus Luttrell
I earlier recommended Marcus Luttrell's *Lone Survivor* about his experiences in Afghanistan as a Navy Seal at war. I love the way he tells the story of war in a graphic

and realistic way. My only hesitation in recommending the book is that there is some offensive language in it. I just wish that some of our military men would clean up their language before they write of their experiences. Such language does not contribute anything to the impact of the book. Here is an excerpt from page 44:

As I go through my days, I've tried to make it a habit to lift my troubles to God. Some guys put their faith in their rifles. Me, I put it all in the grace of the Lord. I know who's in charge and understand whom I serve. When all hell breaks loose and people start falling, God becomes priority number one. Still, the more I learned about the fight for Ramadi in 2006, the more clearly I saw that it might be helpful to take my prayer life to another level.

The Invested Life by Joel Rosenberg
This book is Joel Rosenberg's thesis on discipleship. I have used much of his material in preparing to disciple five couples this spring. I highly recommend this book for you who, like us, are late in the game and feel the desperate need to be discipling others before you get a call from the home office.

Donna's Delights

GRAHAM CRACKER BREAKAWAY

12 Honey Maid full graham crackers
1 stick butter
3/4 cup brown sugar
1 cup swirl chips (white & dark)
1/2 cup toffee chips
1/2 cup pecans

Put parchment paper on jelly pan. Lay graham crackers out on pan with parchment paper. Preheat oven to 350.

Heat butter and brown sugar in sauce pan. Boil 2 minutes. Pour over graham crackers, making sure crackers are completely covered. Bake 6-7 minutes. Put chocolate chips and toffee chips on crackers. Put back in oven about 1 minute or until chocolate melts. Drop chopped pecans over melted chocolate, taking spoon and making sure pecans are in chocolate. Let set!
