

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
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Monday Morning Emails

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


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From THE EDITOR

God bless you and yours this Christmas season.



Dear Friends of Don and Pearl Anderson,



We are so pleased to bring you this memorial issue of *The Grapevine*, reflecting Don and Pearl's forty-four plus years of ministry. Many of you have been associated with the Andersons for the entirety or bulk of that time. Like the rest of us, you were deeply saddened to learn of Don's passing. Those who attended Don's funeral were treated to a joyous celebration of life and will not soon forget the impact that he and Pearl had on so many. It has been my honor to serve on the BTR board of directors. I considered Don my friend and spiritual mentor. If you are reading this issue, I know you feel the same way.

In the months following Don's death, the board of directors wrestled with decisions about the future of Bible Teaching Resources. Our first priority was to ensure that Pearl was well taken care of. She is doing well and continues participating in the ministry.

Together with members of the family, the board determined that there were **two important tasks to accomplish in the short-term**. The first was to produce this memorial issue of *The Grapevine*. As you look through these pages, I hope you smile, perhaps shed a tear, but mostly thank Don and Pearl for their years of devotion to bringing the good news of Jesus to ALL of us. We hope you enjoy this issue as much as the staff enjoyed sifting through all the memories.

Second is a bigger task but one we trust will solidify Don's legacy. Don wanted so much to make his Bible studies and study materials available to the widest audience possible. You can well imagine the wealth of materials Don generated during his more than four decades of ministry. Therein is our second challenge: to "preserve" Don's materials. We have a team of folks working on this effort, which we estimate will take some twelve to fifteen months at least to complete. **The idea is to digitize and catalog his materials, not only to preserve them for the future, but also to make the information portable and easily accessible.** Genevieve Martin, Don's longtime assistant, has rejoined BTR part-time to assist with this effort. Kathleen Leo continues faithfully in the office and is an integral part of this project.

In the meantime, without Don at the helm, there will be a shift in the vision of the ministry. We covet your prayers to help us follow God's will. We will keep the website updated. Please stay tuned to learn of the latest news. For those who were unable to attend Don's funeral, you can find a video of this celebration also on the website as well as a sample of what we hope to do in preserving Don's study materials for use by posterity.

On behalf of Bible Teaching Resources and the board of directors, I want to thank each of you for your support of Don and Pearl over the years. I know your lives have been changed because of Don's ministry, as mine has been changed.

Thank you for your continued prayers and support. **If you wish to donate to what we are calling the Preservation Project, your gift will assist in this worthwhile continuation of Don Anderson's work.** Rest assured, BTR will remain a member of the Evangelical Council of Financial Accountability.

The Preservation Project:

2 TIMOTHY 2:15

As we reflect on Don Anderson's passing and plan ways to preserve his legacy of faithfully studying and teaching the scripture, we can't help but get excited about what the Lord has done and continues to do in and through the ministry of Bible Teaching Resources.

Don's deepest desire has always been to teach God's word and to light a fire in others to hunger for biblical truth.

In October, members of the board, family, and staff met to pray and ask for God's direction in preserving the thousands of pages of manuscripts, reference materials, charts, and books. This is no small task, but under the

direction of the BTR board, we plan on doing just that. Don always said, “Persevere and Press On!” Those of us left behind to carry on his legacy have our own version: “Preserve and Press On!”

You've heard the saying "out of sight, out of mind"? Once Don was no longer able to travel and teach or speak to groups, he began to disciple groups of men locally and nationally who wanted to take up the torch and continue in ministry. They have used his materials, as have many others. We would like to make it easy for everyone to access his life's work.

The staff at the BTR office has been charged with locating, scanning, and

preserving Don's materials. Our plan of action follows. Below is a list of items that will be made available on the Internet based upon each Bible study in the BTR library.

1. Charts

From the very beginning, as part of the inductive study process, Don created and graphed charts of the scripture. These charts could be extremely helpful to seminary students, pastors, and lay teachers who would benefit from his careful dissecting of the scripture.

2. Study notes

Once the "bones" of any Bible study were laid out, Don would use a recorder to dictate and the staff would transcribe the commentaries, book excerpts, references, word studies, and so forth, formatting them into a verse-by-verse study. These notes could be extremely detailed, containing up to 200 pages of material. These extensive study notes are available for most of the studies Don taught from 1994 on. Prior to that time, many of the studies were either typewritten or handwritten.

3. Lecture notes

Once the study notes were compiled and as Don prepared for a tour class, conference, or other speaking engagement, he would clip, highlight, condense, and add emphasis to items he felt were most important to communicate to the particular audience he was addressing. During a Bible study tour, he might repeat this process

before every class. For example, when presenting to a group of retirees, he would emphasize certain applications of scripture different from those he might stress when speaking to a group of businesspeople. His lecture notes include multiple illustrations geared for multiple audiences. These lecture notes could be an invaluable source of information for pastors, teachers, and students.

4. Video/audio recordings

During tour classes and other speaking events, Don's sessions were recorded. These recordings have variously been reproduced on tape, CD, VHS, DVD, and Mp3 format. Many have been streamed on the Internet or broadcast on the radio. BTR sells these audio and visual resources in its webstore. We would like to make these items even more accessible.

5. Transcriptions of audio

The staff years ago began to transcribe Don's audio records. These have been utilized for book publications, magazine articles, and as resources for pastors and lay people who have used them to teach classes and or enrich their own sermons and lessons. These transcripts of Don's messages are potentially excellent tools for those wanting to teach God's word.

6. Books

Some of Don's studies have been published in book form. The texts of these publications have been preserved in pdfs that will allow for online downloading or e-reading.

7. Study guides

Don's study guides have long been available on the BTR website for anyone to access. These will continue to be a part of the preservation process.

8. Commentary bibliography

Don's personal library of commentaries and theological works is extensive. When he began the process of outlining, charting, and preparing to write a study he would consult commentaries from noted biblical scholars, excerpting key points and incorporating that material into his study notes. For many of the studies, annotated bibliographies have been compiled. These resources would be useful for pastors, seminary students, or biblical scholars of all sorts.

Preserving the Legacy

We wish to preserve and make accessible each of Don's studies so that future generations will have the ability to draw on his knowledge and life's work. downloadable items.

Right now, we are in the process of identifying and evaluating the wealth of material Don left us. Currently, we have determined that fifty-one study series with a total of 734 lectures or individual studies need to be preserved. It won't be easy and it won't be fast. We estimate the project will take from twelve to fifteen months just to preserve and properly archive the studies.

Once the studies are archived, we will turn to Don's couples conference materials, Bible teacher training materials, remaining books, and other items. The goal is to preserve and make these items user-friendly and accessible. ☩

With this article is a picture of one of Dad's study charts. As he would begin his study on any book of the Bible, he would first handwrite the entire book on a chart.


One of our funny memories as a family

Kaleo was an oasis of blessing to so many in East Texas. And who could forget Kaleo's Johnnie and Preston Robichaux? They ran the place with dedication and love. Johnnie was kind enough to share many recipes with Grapevine readers over the years. Her delicious cinnamon rolls were a crowd favorite. In this memorial issue, what better tribute could there be to the ministry and friendship that Don and Pearl shared with the Robichauxes than to include the recipe for Johnnie's heavenly cinnamon rolls? Enjoy.

Johnnie's Cinnamon Rolls

Mix together the following:

4 cups flour
1/4 cup sugar
1 tsp salt
Cut in 1 cup butter (softened).

Directions:

Roll out dough in jellyroll fashion; spread melted butter on top; sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon mixed together; sprinkle chopped pecans on top. Roll up lengthwise as tightly as possible. Slice and place in cupcake pans that have been oiled or sprayed with a non-stick spray. Let rise until double in size and bake in a 350-degree oven for about 20 minutes. Ice while still warm with a mixture of powdered sugar, melted butter, vanilla flavoring, and half-n-half blended to the desired consistency.

Stir in a combined mixture of the following:

1 cup milk
3 beaten egg yolks
1 heaping tablespoon yeast dissolved in 1/2 cup of warm water



FINANCIAL REPORT (1978)

Pearl and I and the staff want to thank each of you for the part you have played in being faithful stewards that were available for the Lord to use. Since the beginning of the ministry in 1972, it has been our policy to trust the Lord to supply our needs as we remain faithful in serving Him, without initiating the letting of our needs be known except to the Lord. We have watched the supply prove adequate each month to pay all the bills and meet our needs.

FROM AN EARLY ISSUE OF THE GRAPEVINE : “PINE COVE: TRANSFORMING LIVES”

It was September 1967 when Don and Pearl Anderson left The Firs in Bellingham, Washington, to serve in East Texas at the new Christian camp, Pine Cove on Lake Palestine near Tyler, Texas. In the summer of 1968, Pine Cove played host to over 300 campers. By the time of Don’s departure from Pine Cove in 1972, the center featured a full slate of kids and family camps, serving over 2,700 campers. Today it ministers to tens of thousands of campers every summer and throughout the year in multiple locations.



FROM "REACHING THE PRISON" (GRAPEVINE, SUMMER 1985)

"And He said to them, 'Go into all the world and preach the gospel to all creation.'" Mark 16:15

In 1979 the Lord led a Richardson, Texas, couple named Jean and Wanda Revelt to tape Rev. Don Anderson's Sunday sermons from Hide-A-Way Community Church to minister to shut-ins. They called their tape cassette ministry, "Sunshine for Others." Then the Revelts began praying for the Lord to provide a way to expand this ministry to include prison inmates.

At approximately the same time, another Richardson couple (not acquainted with the Revelts), prayed the Lord would let His Love shine through their lives to inmate families. Jerry and Mary Lou McNevin requested permission to introduce Don's teachings at the Federal Correctional Institution in Seagoville twice a month starting in September 1982.

Many inmates attending the series sought Don's prayers and counsel, and Don Anderson Ministries donated many taped Bible Studies to the prison chapel. Many asked if there was a way for Don's messages to be sent to a new location when they transferred. In December 1984, Don put Wanda and Mary Lou in touch with each other and "Sunshine for Others" now is expanded to include two prisons. Arrangements to include additional prison

facilities are underway. The following letter was recently received from one grateful inmate:

February 27, 1985

Dear Mr. & Mrs. Revelt,

Thank you so much for forwarding those Don Anderson tapes to me. I studied Abraham, The Epistle of I John, the spiritual gifts, and the Sermon on the Mount through his tapes ... For some strange reason, Mormonism, existentialism, and various cults dominate the religious scene here. Because of this, I started a Bible class a couple of months ago. Regardless of whether or not I was qualified, the class had to be done ... And the Lord can use anyone He wants. The tapes are very valuable for exposition, which I need badly for class preparation.





First Bible Study Classes

First Jr. & Sr. High Young Camp (Athens, TX)



Don Anderson: I Made It! Wow, What a Ride!

On Monday, August 1, 2016, family and friends gathered in Tyler, Texas, for a memorial service honoring Dr. Donald Edward Anderson, founder and president of Bible Teaching Resources. A notebook and cowboy hat arranged on Don's otherwise empty director's chair at the front of the chapel reminded all that with his last earthly heartbeat on July 27, he was ushered into the presence of his heavenly father and heard, "Well done."

Don's obituary from the *Tyler Morning Telegraph* has been adapted below. The remarks of those who spoke at the service have also been edited and included here as a tribute to a man who finished the course and kept the faith. A complete digital recording of the memorial service can be found on the BTR website.

The title of this article are words Don often used to describe his entry into heaven, an event he eagerly anticipated.

A Life Lived Well

Born May 21, 1933, in Nebraska to the late Wesley and Rosalea Anderson, Don graduated from Salem High School in Salem, Oregon. He earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Northwestern-St. Paul, where he played varsity baseball and basketball. He received a master of theology degree from Dallas Theological Seminary in 1959 and a doctorate of ministry from Talbot School of Theology.


Don was the founding executive director of Pine Cove camps, where his innovations in developing counselor-centered Christian camping continue. Indeed, Don's philosophy and methodology of Christian camping, honed in his time at The Firs in Bellingham, Washington, and developed fully at Pine Cove, have influenced Christian camps throughout

the nation and world.

In 1972, Don founded Don Anderson Ministries, now known as Bible Teaching Resources, a Christian publishing and teaching ministry based in Tyler, Texas. He was the author of ten books, taught thousands of Bible classes, and spoke at hundreds of camps and conferences. His teachings are featured online and on the radio.

In addition to his work at Pine Cove and Bible Teaching Resources, Don served as program director at The Firs; youth minister at First Presbyterian Church, Bremerton, Washington; Young Life facilitator in Dallas; and pastor of two community churches at Hide-A-Way Lake and Emerald Bay in East Texas.

Always an athlete, Don was a runner, completing the Houston, Las Vegas, and Dallas White Rock marathons. He scaled



several 14,000-foot-plus mountains in the United States and was a Red Cross water safety instructor. He served once as a pregame chaplain for the Dallas Cowboys.

Don Anderson was preceded in death by his precious daughter Becky in 2006. He is survived by his wife of sixty-five years, Pearl Anderson; sister, Lila Graves of Albany,

Oregon; and brother, Marv Anderson of Lebanon, Oregon. He is the father of four surviving children: Donna Skorheim of Tyler, Bobby Anderson of Wichita Falls, Grant Anderson of Seattle, and Julea Gulbrandson of Portland, Oregon. Don and Pearl have ten grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

The Service

It surprised few that Don planned his memorial service. Walter Wilhelm welcomed all; Richard McKellar opened in prayer; Shannon Line performed special music; Travis Markle read Psalm 90. At the end, Joe Freeman closed in prayer. Here are some highlights.

JULEA ANDERSON GULBRANDSON AND FAMILY MEMORIES

My dad, “Coach” to those of you who knew him well, told me that I would be speaking at his funeral today. He told me exactly what story of connection between us he wanted me to relate to you [laughter], and some of you will find this funny because you know how bossy my dad could be. My instinct tells me the reason Dad wanted me to speak on behalf of our family was because he loved to talk about heroes of the faith and now he is one of them in a long legacy of people we have had the privilege of knowing in this journey through life. I think he would also want you to know about three heroes in his life.

The first hero in my dad’s life is my sister Donna. If I had to sum up a life, I would say my sister Donna is driven with a purpose to care about people knowing Jesus. She is so in line with my dad, it is a beautiful thing. She has taken care of my parents in every way humanly possible.

She loves them. She was not afraid to connect with my dad and care for him in a way that he really needed.

The second hero in my dad’s life is my brother Bobby. I followed his lead in caring for my dad. I depend on his wisdom. I am not sure how to put into words what a pure, humble hero he is. About a month ago, when my daughters and I were staying with my mom, I woke up early in the morning and went searching for my brother. I found him dripping with sweat, standing on a ladder, big clippers in his hands, cutting back a bush in my parents’ driveway.

“Every time I visit Dad, he always wants me to cut this bush back,” Bobby said. This is a perfect example of this humble, supportive hero of a man. He cares and does the right thing in the most profoundly self-sacrificing and meaningful, everyday productive way.

The third hero in my dad’s life is my mom. Gratefulness has changed my life. Gratefulness has a way of getting me out of the cocoon of life and breaking me free as

a butterfly. It sounds cliché, I know, but it has worked for me. Every day I write down six things I am grateful for, and it changes me. My daughter Taylor, who knows the meaning of gratefulness too, decided a few weeks ago, that it was time to tell each other what we were grateful for in each other. My mom, Taylor, Ella, and I did so around the dinner table. When it was my turn to talk about my mom, I couldn't speak at first as a wave of emotion overtook me. As I gained my composure, I told my mom that I was grateful for the example of a caring and committed wife.

My mom cared deeply and patiently and beautifully for my dad. I overheard some of their conversations at the hospital and rehab and when things turned awful, such as the following:

"It is okay, darling. I know it is just the medicine confusing you."

"I love you. I will be back to see you soon."

"We spent our lives together. We want to be together."

"I just want him to have the best life he can have here at the end."

My mom has loved the man so deeply, so richly, and so much like God would love us. This woman has done a good job, as I have heard her say so many times when she feels good about a situation. She displayed for our family what it means to do a good job.

But let me return to the idea of gratefulness. My dad has given me the most beautiful, lifelong gift by demonstrating and teaching what it means to live in an intimate, personal way with Jesus. For that, I am grateful. Thank you, Dad. I know you are up in heaven right

now, bossing around some angels.

The last story I leave you with is my dad's and my favorite memory together. This is the story he wanted me to tell you. When I was in middle school, my dad took a bunch of us on a canoe trip in the middle of the Minnesota wilderness. We were mostly miserable on this trip because it was so much work. I still use lessons from that trip with my kids today.

My dad and I decided we would go fishing early in the morning before everybody woke up so we climbed in a canoe. There was fog and mist on the calm, still lake. We could hear the slow call of the loons. My dad said to me, "The only problem we will have is, if we catch a pike, it will try to bite us."

So sure enough, our tranquil scene erupted into a frenzy. My dad caught a pike. We put it into the canoe, both terrified it would bite us. We started beating the jumping, flopping fish with canoe paddles. We were both laughing so hard, we were relieved we didn't capsize the boat. We were so glad to have a fish to eat instead of our normal backpack meal.

In this little story, my dad gave me many gifts that I still recognize as meaningful. Some of those gifts include one that showed me what connection with a parent can be like. Other than connecting with God and my husband, my most important connection in life is with my children. Dad gave me such an appreciation of the outdoors. Dad also nurtured in me a desire to have fun. Fun is one of those things that make my life worth living, especially when circumstances are painful and dreary. Fun raises our spirits and

props us up when we feel like falling, like that miserable trip in the Minnesota wilderness where we found fun. Thank you, Dad.

RICH KNARR

The Andersons have been dear friends of my family for over forty years. I have many fond memories as a young boy of going on father-son camping trips with Don. It feels a little funny for me to call him Don. As Julea mentioned, I knew him as Coach. We had a good, fun group that would go on these trips all those years ago. We went to places like Big Bend, Lake Amistad, the Illinois River up in Oklahoma, where Pearl is from. Big adventures for a little boy.

But the story I want to share with you is one in which Don had an impact on me when I was a little bit older. It was my fifteenth birthday, a special one for me. Not only was I turning fifteen, but it was also the day I became an Eagle Scout.

Being in the Boy Scouts at that time, I was really into camping and backpacking and outdoor adventure, a lot of the things Don liked, too. As such, there were two items of gear that I really wanted: a new North Face sleeping bag called the Blue Kazoo, the latest and greatest, state of the art, perfect for backpacking and very expensive. The other was a pair of top of the line Danner hiking boots, also very expensive.

Don and my dad shared an office building together and I was the janitor. As I was cleaning the office a few nights before my birthday, I worked my way over to Don's side of the building to find him

there working late and waiting on me.

He called me into his office and he had gifts for me. Any guesses? The first was the Blue Kazoo. And the second was a brand new pair of Danner hiking boots, size ten. I still remember this day how thrilled I was to get those gifts. I wondered how he knew. For a fifteen-year-old kid, both of those items were monetarily out of my reach, even on my janitor's salary. The hiking boots are long gone, but I still have that Blue Kazoo. It's worn and old but I still use it.

Don had a third gift for me that evening, a Bible. Inside he had quoted Ecclesiastes 2:1 and 2 Timothy 4:12, listed other verses, and closed with these words: "Go forth, man. You have the tools right here in your hand."

I can't read the fine print of this Bible any more as my eyes get older, but it's still my favorite. I will never forget the impact that night had on me. Don encouraged me. He showed belief in me.

One word that would describe my admiration of Don is attitude, as in positive attitude. I loved that about Don. He always had a wonderful, positive attitude. Whenever he was teaching or engaging us in the word, he always did it with a wonderful positive attitude, always encouraging. I am thankful and grateful for knowing Don and I am humbled and honored that he saw value in me, that he took the time to invest in me. I love you, Coach, and I miss you.

DICK KNARR

I would be remiss if I did not point out to everyone present that to live with a man for sixty-five years has got to be a God

thing. Pearl, your crown is filled with stars.

His name is Donald Edward Anderson. Pearl calls him Don. I call him Coach. One of Merriam Webster's definitions for the word coach says "to train intensively, as by instruction and demonstration." Some of the synonyms for coach are guide, counsel, lead, mentor, tutor, and shepherd. I think Mr. Webster must have known Coach.

Coach and I go back a long, long way, to about 1967, when Coach came from the state of Washington to Texas. Pine Cove was just getting started and needed a director, so Coach came to get it rolling. I had heard that the new director's name was Don Anderson. That was when the great running back from Texas Tech had signed with the Green Bay Packers for 660,000 dollars. His name was Donny Anderson. So naturally I thought I was going to get to meet a wealthy football player turned camp administrator. Football player, wealthy—neither turned out to be true. But Coach turned out to be wealthy in a different way.

In God's bank, there is an account of saved souls. Coach made many, many deposits to that account. How many people has he led to our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ? How many has he influenced to return to Jesus Christ? How many has he encouraged who were down and out and downtrodden to seek our Lord Jesus? How many workers for Christ did he help to sharpen their skills so that they might better spread the word? How many? How many? I can't count that far.

We have camped together, canoed together, hiked together, studied together, officed together, fished together, cried

together, laughed together. I reckon you could say that we have shared life together.

One of my favorite of Coach's sayings was, "You never really get to know a man until you pitch a wet tent with him." Coach and I really got to know each other. We pitched a few wet tents together. Coach set a wonderful example for me. Unlike me, he never complained.

There is an inexorable outcome to life: death. As Coach lived that time, he continued with that wonderful, positive attitude. And he was thankful to those who were trying to help him. He set the example to you and me of how to emulate Jesus Christ.

Now, you and I need to go into the world and do the same. I close with one of my favorite quotes, an old American Indian saying. "When you were born, you cried and the world rejoiced. Live your life in such a way that when you die, the world will cry and you will rejoice." I'm crying. Coach is rejoicing. Goodbye, old friend. Save me a place.

How many of you remember Don saying, "The prophet Habakkuk is going to ask you, when you get to heaven, 'Have you read my book?'" I know Habakkuk has greeted Don and not only thanked him for reading his book, but for also teaching about it.

Don asked me to speak on the importance of accountability. For the last thirteen years, Don and I have met on the first Saturday of the month. When we first began meeting, I was going through a

difficult time, and Don really ministered to me and my faith grew and matured. As the years passed, our time was spent discussing our walk with the Lord, our family, business, other relationships, the things that most accountability groups cover.

However, what I want to share with you today is that we were more than accountability buddies, as he referred to us. We were investment buddies. The book *The Invested Life* by one of Don's favorite authors, Joel Rosenberg, influenced the latter part of Don's ministry. It's one of the reasons that the couples discipleship groups were formed. It's the Great Commission in Matthew 28:19 played out: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations."

Remember that I told you a few minutes ago that my faith grew and matured as a result of those monthly meetings? It's because Don recognized that I was a babe in Christ. And the Lord used that opportunity to make me a more faithful and committed disciple.

Don invested in my life and I know in each one of you as well. And that is his charge for us today. Carrying out the Great Commission of Matthew 28:19 by investing in the lives of others.

A circuit riding Bible teacher made impressions on the lives of five men comprising the first group of disciples in whom Don Anderson invested in his final years. We are grateful for the investment that Don and Pearl have made in a Navy submariner, an actor and avid outdoorsman, an American Airlines

pilot, a Navy SEAL, and a civil engineer, alongside their loving wives.

In terms of a relationship with Jesus Christ, Don Anderson was the most devoted man I ever met. His unique ability to passionately share the gospel was peerless and he worked tirelessly through his very last days committed to that end. Despite enormous physical limitations, Don was eager, always there for us, chomping at the bit, kicking in the stall, well-prepared and faithful to the end, whether face-to-face, during Saturday mornings on Google Hangouts, or through hour long discussions on the phone about matters of faith and life. His personal example inspired us to improve daily the quality of our devotional time with God and he provided solid methods and resources to do just that.

Like his cowboy heroes, Don was a straight shooter, never missing his target and never pulling punches. Let me illustrate. As a career Navy submariner and now working as a Navy civilian supporting that enterprise, I do noble work. Don thought so. His love of country and support for the military, past and present, was one more facet of his complex character.

One day on the phone, after a significant positive milestone in my career, I stated that I was often conflicted with the noble work that I was doing for the nation as opposed to the more noble work I could be doing for the Lord. Imagine the smile on Don's face as he replied, "Brian, I hope you agonize over this every day."

Wow. It's good to celebrate the life of a true champion, Dr. Don Anderson. Years ago, I moved into a little community called Hide-A-Way. People there told me, "You really need to meet our pastor."

I said, "Well why is that?"

"He likes the same things that you like. He loves the outdoors. He likes to camp. He likes to fish. He likes to do all those things that you like to do. He's an athlete. My goodness, he's done marathons."

I thought, wow, I really do need to meet him. I couldn't wait to get to that first church service and hear him speak. I was impressed. I met him right after that. I met Pearl right after that. And man was I overly impressed then. I'd go to his office and sit down to talk to him. The more we talked, the more I knew we were gonna be great friends. I had done a marathon. He had done three. I thought, this man's crazier than I am.

Jenny and I would go to Don and Pearl's house. They would come to our house. We'd have dinner. And we absolutely loved being with them. Pearl, she wasn't just his wife, she wasn't just his helpmate: Pearl Anderson completed Don Anderson. An amazing duo. An amazing life that we celebrate today.

I've been a friend of Don's for some nine years. Nine years I've known Don and I could never think of a day that I didn't enjoy knowing him. Not only was he funny, but he told things in a way that you could understand them.

He said, "Jake, God doesn't want a performance. He wants a relationship." After Jenny and I were with Don and Pearl for any length of time, we started having a

much more pronounced relationship with God. Our lives changed. We started studying more of the Bible. We started reading it from end to end, together. We had a devotional every single morning. It's almost osmosis. Because we were around Don and Pearl, we started praying together out loud.

I started wanting to relate to other people about what God had done to me. When I would go to Don's office, he would always give me a book. Man, I've got more books from Don! I've written one book. Don's written ten! And we did a book together, *What an Awesome God!*

I love nature. I love seeing things in nature. I love photography in nature. Don and I agreed there is a gift from God out there if you'll look at nature. You just have to see it. It's a beauty. If you see that beauty, you get that gift that God has given each one of us. Oftentimes when we go into nature, we don't even see it. We don't even think about it. But it's there all the same.

You know Don was a marriage counselor. He counseled us on marriage. I am married to Jenny, the sweetest, most wonderful wife in the world.

He said, "Everybody has to work on their marriage."

I am an airline captain and I was surprised when Don selected me to disciple. I grew up in a Methodist church and my parents usually just dropped me

I think that is probably the lesson here. As I move forward in my life, I didn't realize how important it is to be prepared to share Christ.

During one of those early jobs I had, when I was a young pup, the captain turned to me and said, "So, do you have a relationship with Jesus Christ?"

"I'm good on that," I replied. "My relationship with God is personal. I don't want to talk about it." Does that sound like a Christian to you?

Years later, when I was saved, I got to thinking about all the people God had placed in my life.

I just kind of limped along. I didn't worry about the things I might do to represent God, to share my faith, till I met Don.

It started with my wife's family who were attending retreats and conferences with Don and Pearl. It never worked out in my schedule for me to participate. My wife insisted I go so to Colorado we went.

The first day of going to class with Don, my wife planted us in the front row. When I saw them wheel Don in, I saw he needed help going up the stairs. I got a little nudge from behind. It wasn't my wife. I jumped up to help him up the stairs. I didn't know why. I do now. We are called to serve.

Don Anderson was amazing at bringing that out of us.

When Don called me to be part of a discipleship group, I replied, "I'm not your guy. I haven't studied. I am not learned. I don't know what to do. I'm not ready to retire from flying. I'm good right now."

Don reminded me, "Yeah, but what's next? What are you going to do with that?" He reminded me that on a day to day basis, the opportunities I have to share my faith, are the most important parts of my walk right now. But we need to be prepared for the next. We need to listen for the whispers of God because He has a plan for all of us and He'll tell us if we will listen.

Our relationship began Labor Day weekend 2011. My wife and I attended a camp at the Dunes Bible camp on the Washington coast. I had heard of Don from my senior pastor and from people in my church, including a special couple who had been part of a youth groups he led long ago.

At that first Dunes class, Don quoted from the book *Lone Survivor* where Marcus

Luttrell discusses part of the Navy SEAL ethos of determination and commitment. Don used this example to say that he wished someone would write an ethos for the Christian warrior similar to the SEAL ethos.

My heart raced. My mind lit up. I didn't go to Don right away and tell him I had served 20 years as a SEAL. I didn't know Marcus Luttrell personally but knew several of the SEALs he talks about in his book about Operation Redwing, which is what *Lone Survivor* is based on.

Another member of our church also knew Don and mentioned my military service. These seemingly small acts started a rich and rewarding relationship with Don and Pearl.

After my Navy service, I became a middle school teacher. I consider teaching a much harder profession than being a SEAL. My strength was in my physical ability but my weakness was in relationships. You need to be able to build relationships to excel as a teacher and Don well knew this.

My second career as a teacher was another connection to Don, who was a teacher of teachers. There's no doubt God had been preparing Jeanne and me for this relationship with Don and Pearl many years prior to our meeting. God was in this.

This relationship was only possible because I allowed Christ in my heart. I made myself available. For the next three years we attended family camp at the Dunes to hear Don's teaching. They provided us with this discipleship notebook. They were constantly sending us books and studies to use. They called us to Granbury, Texas, in 2014 for a special retreat with others who

are here today. This retreat forged special relationships dear to us today.

The most valuable gift Don gave was the gift of time. We started meeting on Google apps. Don led us through Revelation and Hebrews.

Don demonstrated how always to push through adversity. He lost his physical ability to get around but that didn't stop him. He humbled himself, trusted God, and allowed others to help him with that task. He never gave up the fight. Don once told me that God is looking for FAT disciples: faithful, available, teachable. Don was FAT to the end.

I did rewrite a small portion of the SEAL ethos, thinking of Don as I did. Here it is:

I will never quit. I persevere and look to God in times of adversity. God expects me to be spiritually fit, to equip myself with the full armor of God so that I may face my enemy. If I am knocked down, God will be there every time to pick me up. I draw on every ounce of strength that God provides to love others and to accomplish the mission of the gospel. I am never out of the fight until God calls me home. We expect to be led by Christ. There is no absence of orders because Christ has made the way clear, but I may have to wait on Him. I will lead others as God sees fit to carry out His will. I lead by the example Christ has set in all situations.

Of Don's 83 years on earth, I was fortunate to know him the last five. I initially met Don at a lunchtime Bible study in downtown Fort Worth at St. Andrews Church that I was invited to by a coworker. Little did I know that the Lord

was about to introduce to me one of the most valuable people that I would come to know in my life.

I had been praying for the right person who would be willing to invest in me, mentor me, and teach me how to rightly and accurately divide the word of God. At this particular time in my life, I was in the early stages of my teaching ministry and needed guidance to help me develop in this area. After having attended a few of Don's studies, at the end of a session I waited around to watch how all of the attendees greeted Don to say thank you and observed how he greeted each one of them with the warmest smile. Some were longtime friends and some new acquaintances, but he treated them all the same.

So after they all left, I was able to build up enough courage to walk up to Don and introduce myself. He, in kind, greeted me with the biggest smile and treated me as if I were a longtime friend and the most important person in the world. I asked him a few questions about the Bible study while waiting for an opportunity to ask Don if he would be willing to mentor me and take me under his wing. I am certain this ordeal lasted about two minutes but it felt like a lifetime. After he answered my questions, I popped the question and asked Don if he would be willing to mentor me and to show me how to teach the word of God. Without hesitation or without blinking an eye, he looked me straight in the eye and said, "You betcha." It was that easy for him. What seemed to take all the faith that I had at the time was met with a split second acceptance.

We exchanged contact information and

Don began immediately pouring into me and taking an interest in me as a student of the word of God. I remember telling my wife about this experience with God and how God had answered my prayers for a mentor. She was excited. She knew my need for such guidance.

I remember Pearl jokingly coming up to me and asking, "Well, have you had enough yet? You better be careful what you ask for!" And she was right. To call Don a bookaholic would be an understatement. If there was a rehabilitation center for people addicted to books, Don would have taken up permanent residency there a long time ago.

Prior to meeting Don, I did not have a dedicated library in my house. After a brief time under Don's discipleship, I realized I needed to get one sooner rather than later. I told my wife I wished I had met Don sooner, but then I realized I probably would have needed a much bigger house to hold all the books he would have sent me.

When I think back to this introduction with Don, it was certainly a God thing. For a guy standing here, originally from the small island of Nassau, Bahamas, to connect with a seasoned teacher of God's word from Tyler, Texas, it could only be the doings of God. Not only did God answer my prayer, but he did so exceedingly, abundantly beyond all I could have ever asked for in Don Anderson.

Some of you may think that you cannot have a relationship with God or that you are not loved by God because you haven't studied every chapter of the Bible. You haven't gone on a dedicated life experience of teaching God's word, like Don has done.

His life demonstrated not only how we are to run, but also how we are to finish and finish strong, running through the tape and leaning forward, breaking the tape as we complete our race. As Don would always say, "There is no retirement in the Christian life. Until we are called home into the home office, we need to be maturing and growing every single day."

There will not be another Don Anderson. We are all called to a specific purpose in God's master plan. However, it is such a blessing when others like Don come into our lives and help us to be molded into what Jesus Christ has created us to be. ☩



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
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
